

PROF. WALKER'S DEATH. INTELLECT THE MASTER OF PAIN.

THE CORONER'S INVESTIGATION—THE SYMPTOMS OF POISONING DESCRIBED BY THE DYING MAN—THE FINAL RESULT CAUSED BY A NEGLECT OF THE PHYSICIAN'S CAUTIONS. The inquest upon the death of Prof. Frederic W. Walker at No. 30 State-st., Brooklyn, was held yesterday.

Prof. Walker had been suffering from a complaint which he described as a "dyspepsia" or "indigestion" for some time. He had been treated by various physicians, but without success. On Saturday afternoon, he was administered a large quantity of fluid extract of hemlock.

The inquest was held at the residence of Dr. Edward R. Squibb, the chemist, who is the proprietor of the establishment for the manufacture of standard preparations, was asked about the case. He said that on Saturday afternoon last he received a call from Prof. Walker.
