TRYING TO HIDE A MURDER.

AN ENGINE MANGLING A DEAD BODY.

A PATERSON FIREMAN'S BODY RUN OVER NEAR PASSAIC BRIDGE—EVIDENCE OF A PREVIOUS MURDER—NO CLUE TO THE AUTHORS OF THE CRIME.

THE DISCOVERY OF THE CRIME.

THE HEAD NEARLY SEVERED FROM THE BODY BY AN ENGINE—THE INVESTIGATION BY THE CORONER—THE EVIDENCE WHICH LED TO THE CONCLUSION THAT MURDER HAD BEEN COMMITTED.

AS CONDUCTOR HENRY SEYBOLD'S FREIGHT TRAIN, ON THE NEW YORK, LITTLE ROCK AND WESTERN RAILROAD, APPROACHED THE PASSAIC BRIDGE SATURDAY NIGHT, AT 10:30 O'CLOCK, ON ITS WAY TO JERSEY CITY, THE ENGINE, JOHN SEED, DISCOVERED THE BODY OF A MAN ON THE TRACK, NEAR THE CROSSING LEADING TO MAYOR AVERY'S RESIDENCE.

The body of Bartholomew McGrail, a Paterson fireman, was struck by an engine on the Erie Road, near Passaic Bridge, late Sunday night, and the head was nearly severed from the trunk. Evidence was discovered afterwards that McGrail had been murdered and his body placed on the track. No clue was found to the murderers.

THE DISCOVERY OF THE CRIME.

THE HEAD NEARLY SEVERED FROM THE BODY BY AN ENGINE—THE INVESTIGATION BY THE CORONER—THE EVIDENCE WHICH LED TO THE CONCLUSION THAT MURDER HAD BEEN COMMITTED.

As Conductor Henry Seybold's freight train, on the New York, Little Rock and Western Railroad, approached the Passaic Bridge Station Sunday night, at 10:30 o'clock, on its way to Jersey City, the engineer, John Seed, discovered the body of a man on the track, near the crossing leading to Mayor Avery's residence. The engineer at once whistled down brakes and reversed his
