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THE FEVER IN THE SOUTH.

A MORTALITY OF OVER 6,000. MEMPHIS AND NEW-ORLEANS NOW THE CHIEF CENTERS OF TROUBLE—FAVORABLE REPORTS FROM OTHER PLACES.

The reports of death from yellow fever show the mortality up to this time to have been over 5,600. There is no evidence of any further spread of the disease, and the daily number of deaths is growing smaller.

THE MORTALITY IN THREE CITIES. MEMPHIS NOW THE CHIEF CENTER OF THE SICKNESS—A CARD FROM THE NEW-ORLEANS MASONIC CANTON.

MEMPHIS, Sept. 16.—The mortality to-day has been greater than was anticipated, 111 deaths having been reported. Of these, thirty-six were colored. Yesterday there were ninety-eight deaths instead of ninety, as reported in these dispatches.

NEW-ORLEANS, Sept. 16.—The weather is clear and pleasant, the deaths to-day numbered 97, and the reported cases 242, only half of which bear date since September 12. The following address was issued to-day:

GALLIPOLIS, Sept. 16.—Two deaths occurred in the fever district on Saturday night, and two on Sunday night. There have been sixteen cases of unduly yellow fever, all directly traceable to the steamer John Porter.
