THE STATION ISLAND MYSTERY.

VISIT OF THE ALLEGED BETRAYAL OF ANNIE HONNELL—A NEW MEANS OF IDENTIFICATION SUGGESTED.

A new chapter was added to the story of the station island tragedy on Saturday, by the visit to the island of Moses Schoenfeld, the Hebrew eldritch of Sauerbrey, who is alleged to have betrayed Annie Honnell, with his wife and a lawyer, Corrie Whitaker.

The Hebrew, his wife and the lawyer then drove to the County Poorhouse, seven miles distant, and examined the long board of hair that George Homnell, last Friday, said was the hair of the girl who was his daughter.

Coroner Dempsey received several anonymous letters on Saturday, the contents of some importance could be gained from them. One, postmarked Jersey City, written in a weak, feminine hand, said that Ellen Murphy was alive and in Jersey City.

The attention of Coroner Dempsey was called yesterday to a statement said to have been made by Mrs. Honnell's sister, Annie, on Friday last, in which she stated that she had broken her arm.

FERDINAND BLIENTZ HELD FOR THE GRAND JURY'S ACTION.

An inquest was held Saturday in the case of A. Wolf Adams, No. 353 East Fifth-st., who was beaten by Ferdinand Blientz, on September 11 last, at the residence of Mrs. Adams, at about 3 o'clock on the afternoon of September 17, when she was in the yard of No. 15 Stanton-st., she saw Blientz acting in a threatening manner toward an old man who was sitting in a chair in Blientz's room, while Mrs. Blientz stood by the window laughing.

Mrs. Blientz testified that Adams called at her room on Tuesday and asked her if she took in washing. She said she did not and went away saying he would bring his clothes in the afternoon.

TARRYTOWN'S DEFAULTING TREASURER.

A VILLAGE THAT HAS ONLY ONE DOLLAR AND TWENTY-FIVE CENTS IN BANK TO ITS CREDIT.

The village of Tarrytown is much excited by the reported defalcation, and by the arrest of an old and respected officer, J. Benedict See, treasurer of North Tarrytown and Clerk of Mount Pleasant, upon the complaint of the Trustee of the Tarrytown Turnpike, of the defalcation of the funds of the town.

THE FLATBUSH ASYLUM TROUBLE.

DR. R. L. PARSONS FINALLY REMOVED. The Kings County Commissioners of Charities on August 1 removed Dr. R. L. Parsons, medical superintendent of the Flatbush Asylum for the insane, and appointed in his place Dr. John E. Shaw. The change was to take effect September 1. On August 21, Dr. Parsons, State Commissioner of Lunacy, directed the Commissioners to retain Dr. Parsons until sufficient reasons were shown for his removal.
