THE NEWS THIS MORNING.

FOREIGN.—The British Parliament is to be dissolved March 23.
General Castillo, an insurgent leader, has been killed in Santo Domingo.

DOMESTIC.—M. de Lesseps explained his canal project to a committee of the House of Representatives yesterday.
The constitutional law was affirmed by the United States Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court yesterday rendered a decision of great importance, touching the constitutionality of the Election laws and the power of Congress to supervise the election of Representatives.

It is a matter for universal congratulation that Governor Holliday's courageous veto of the Virginia Repudiation bill has been sustained, though only in the negative way of a failure on the part of the repudiators to secure a full two-thirds vote.

There has always been so much misapprehension in the popular mind concerning the amount of unclaimed deposits in the savings banks, that it is not surprising to find the familiar proposition that they shall be confiscated by the State again making its appearance in the Legislature.

The President's brief and explicit Message upon the proposed Inter-oceanic canal, reaffirms the traditional American doctrine with clearness, firmness, and dignity.

Lord Beaconsfield appeals to the country at last. A fortnight ago the leader of the House of Commons gave notice of a resolution facilitating the dispatch of business, and the obvious inference was the intention of the Government to order a general election during the Spring.

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THE CANAL AND THE MONROE DOCTRINE.
The question whether the Monroe Doctrine applies exactly to the project of the Panama Canal is not of vital importance.

It is urged that the independent Government of Colombia has a perfect right to grant privileges for the construction of a French canal across its territory.

The present Parliament assembled on March 5, 1874. It remains in session until Easter its political term will be six years and twenty-two days.
