THIRD DAY OF THE BOOK SALE. THE BIDDING LIVE AND FAIR PRICES OBTAINED...

The third day of the year sale of books opened at Clinton Hall at 9 a. m. yesterday. There were about seventy purchasers present, representing booksellers in all parts of the United States.

The afternoon session was opened with the invoice of William A. Gottschalk of this city. There were only sixteen books in this lot, consisting principally of Poe's works.

Collins & Brother, of this city, offered sixteen books, which were readily disposed of. The incident of the day was the busy one Judge Bourgeois' "A Fool's Errand."

Henry C. Lea's Son & Co., of Philadelphia, were the next publishers on the stand. The entire invoice of this firm consisted of 1,000 books.

The invoice of Belmont, Clarke & Co., of Chicago, was the next. In the evening, this invoice consisted principally of Thomas Paine's works and the works of other writers on free thought, socialism and utilitarianism.

The invoice of Charles H. Graves, of Boston, was the next called. It was composed for the most part of the works of Rev. D. C. Eddy, D. D., and of Mrs. Matheine Leslie.

The invoice of William T. Annis, George Barrie, J. Fagan & Co., of Boston, and of John Foster & Co., of Philadelphia, will be called.
