PROPOSED TWO PER CENT BONDS. WASHINGTON, June 29.—Representative Kelley, chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, will to-morrow introduce into the House, by direction of that committee, and will endeavor to have passed with unanimous consent, a joint resolution authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to issue in his discretion 2 per cent bonds to the amount of \$200,000,000, and to exchange them for outstanding obligations of the United States bearing a higher rate of interest than 2 per cent.
