THE HOMICIDE AT FORT LEE.

No additional facts of importance were brought to light yesterday to solve the doubtful respecting the array at Fort Lee on Sunday night, in which John Lahey, Jr., was killed by a pistol shot.

The first witness yesterday before the coroner's jury was James Addison, the carpenter at Fort Lee, who stated that there had long been a bitter feeling between Fort Lee and the neighborhood around Warren and Hovey, who, while living in New-York, have been employed in New Jersey.

There were other witnesses, but none of them told anything of importance. After considerable delay the jury announced their verdict that John Lahey, Jr., came to his death from a pistol shot wound on the evening of Sunday night, at Fort Lee.

Coroner Knox began an investigation yesterday into the manner of the death of Henry J. Burns, engineer of the tugboat Champlain.

Several friends came on board after the captain went away, and stayed till the tugboat was started. They were all intoxicated. Burns slipped Minery's face; Minery did not retaliate.

Thomas H. Perry, a stevedore, said: List in a minute the exact end of Pier No. 52 on Sunday, and about 10 o'clock heard a quarrel on the Champlain and a voice saying: "I'll show you overboard!"

Peter Farrell, a watchman at Pier No. 44, also heard the quarrel on the tugboat. He said: "The men were accusing each other of concealing a keg of beer, and he heard one say: 'If you don't bring out that beer I'll throw you overboard.'"

Vincent Costello, fireman of the Champlain, said: Several friends came on board after the captain went away, and stayed till the tugboat was started. They were all intoxicated.

The blood on his hand, seen by Mrs. Burns, the witness said, was caused by a cut received taking up the clothes from the carriage, but he did not remember when it occurred.

Coroner Knox, deeming the testimony insufficient to send the prisoner to the Tombs, ordered him to be held in custody. He also directed Captain Gastin to look for "Al," who is believed to be the man who fired the shot.
