

THE LIBERAL CONFERENCE.

MEASURES FAVORED BY THE PARTY. CLAUSE OF THE SESSION—SPEECHES BY MR. BRIGHT AND HERBERT GLADSTONE.

RESOLUTIONS AND SPEECHES.

LEID, Oct. 18.—At the Liberal Conference today a resolution was adopted in favor of the redistribution of the seats in Parliament in order to secure a true expression of the will of the Nation.

A resolution was adopted declaring that any attempt to secure the representation of minorities by the enactment of special laws is in violation of the principles of popular representative government.

A resolution was introduced by Sir Wilfrid Lawson, M. P. for Carlisle, condemning the action of the House of Commons in refusing to allow Mr. Bradlaugh to take his seat therein, and favoring the abolition of Parliamentary oaths.

A resolution was adopted in favor of shortening the period of time required for the qualification of voters, extending the hours for polling votes, and making constituencies pay the expenses of elections.

DESTRUCTION BY EARTHQUAKES. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 18.—Among the villages destroyed by the earthquake recently felt in the Grecian Archipelago and Anatolia were Katopnaya, Reis, Dere and Lidja.

MEMORIAL CHURCH TO THE LATE CZAR. ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 18.—The corner-stone of the church which is to be erected upon the spot where the Emperor Alexander II. was killed was laid to-day by the Czar and Zarina with imposing ceremonies.

TARIFF REFORM IN SPAIN. MADRID, Oct. 18.—Señor Posada-Herrera, the Prime Minister, was called upon to-day by the Tariff Reform Society.

PRUSSIA, ITALY AND THE VATICAN. ROME, Oct. 18.—The Vatican is arranging a convention with Prussia providing for the improvement of the relations between that country and the Holy See and for the restoration to their dioceses, without the enactment of new laws, of those bishops who have been expelled from the country.

SEVERE STORM ON THE BRITISH COAST. LONDON, Oct. 18.—High tides and severe gales prevail on the coasts and numerous marine casualties are reported.
