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NEW PLANS OF TAMMANY.

FOR AMENDING THE NEW-YORK CHARTER. TO TAKE POWERS AWAY FROM THE MAYOR—FORMER RE-INTRODUCED BY THE SENATE.

ALBANY, Jan. 18.—Tammany Hall submitted several important amendments to the Charter of the City of New-York to the Assembly to-night. They were presented by Mr. Burns, a Tammany Hall representative and a member of the Committee on Cities. One of the amendments abolishes the present four-headed Board of Park Commissioners and substitutes a board of two Commissioners to be appointed by Mr. Moore, the Tammany Hall President, of the Board of Public Works.
