LONDON, April 15.—Sir George Trevelyan's letter attacking the Coercion bill is the sensation of the hour.

Considering the antecedents in the Government of Ireland, his action with regard to the bill and the terms in which the document is couched is the most damaging condemnation of the Tory policy that has yet appeared.

It is my belief that the effect of this letter upon English opinion will be second only to that produced by the conversion of Lord Spencer.

The point of Sir George Trevelyan's hostility to the present Coercion bill, according to his own statement, is that it is levelled at politicians, press writers and press workers, and not at criminals.

It is, however, in reality only strengthens the case because what it proves is what Sir George Trevelyan a few weeks ago said with honest logic, namely, that a course of coercion is up and that Lord Spencer tried it out to the utmost and they failed.

AN UPROAR IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

SIR WILLIAM HARBOURD DECLARING THAT THE COERCION LAW WOULD FAIL—A VIOLENT TORY SPEECH BY MAJOR SAUNDERS.

LONDON, April 15.—Sir William Vernon Harbord, resuming the debate on the Coercion bill, in the House of Commons, to-day, announced, said the present intention of the Liberals and Parliament was based on the Liberal recognition of the fact that the wisest policy in Irish affairs lay in the acceptance of some form of Irish government which would tend to satisfy the Irish people.

He twitted Lord Randolph Churchill and Mr. Chamberlain with having secretly consulted Mr. Parnell, seeking to make an alliance with him for their own purposes. The split in which the Government would admit the Coercion Act, if it were passed, was sufficiently shown in the appointment of Colonel King-Harman to the Parliamentary Under-Secretaryship for Ireland.

As to the Tory and Liberal Unionists about American gold fostering Irish discontent, Sir William Vernon Harbord said: "There are none who have less reason to complain of American gold than the Irish landlords, for none get more of it. They get it through their poor tenants' rents."

A TORNADO'S PATH IN OHIO.

DESTRUCTION NEAR ST. CLAIRSVILLE.

HOUSES AND CHURCHES DEMOLISHED—NEW CASUALTIES—THE DAMAGE ESTIMATED AT OVER A MILLION—WHEELING FEELS THE STORM.

WHEELING, W. Va., April 15.—A tornado this afternoon wrought devastation over a section of country extending from St. Clairsville, Ohio, ten miles west.

At St. Clairsville, Ohio, ten miles west of Wheeling, the high hills on both sides of the river sheltering the houses. The storm was first felt at St. Clairsville at 3:15 p. m. It appeared to be travelling from the West and in the shape of a funnel-shaped mass of cloud.

Houses were demolished, trees snapped off like poplars, horses and cattle prostrated and carried bodily hundreds of yards by the gale, and the sky was darkened with the clouds of flying debris.

Horses hithed in the street were blown about like kites, and the vehicles demolished. A mill race cut as clean a hole in the two walls of a brick house as a cannon ball would; shingles were driven through the weather-boarding like arrows.

When the storm struck the river the water shot up in a perpendicular wall about twenty feet and then fell back in seething foam, and simultaneously a shower of some large sections of iron fell from the sky.
