MILITIA IN TRAINING.

PREPARING FOR DUTY IN CAMP. COMPANIES THAT HAVE GOOD RECORDS—PRACTICE AT THE TARGETS.

Adjutant Arthur F. Schermerhorn, of the 12th Regt. of Artillery, has been detailed as Post Adjutant of the State Camp of Instruction near Westkill, during the week ending June 10. He will be in charge of the instruction of the militia in the camp from June 18 to June 25 and will remain there with his own regiment also during the following week.

For the guidance of troops ordered to the State Camp the following extract from general orders issued by the commander-in-chief are published:

In order that the troops be ordered to the State Camp this season may derive the fullest benefit of their tour of duty, officers and privates are reminded that as has been frequently stated before, the camp has been established for instruction only; that anything calculated to interfere with this object, such as idleness, loafing, and discipline and decorum must at all times be observed; and it is ordered:

The military exercises to be executed and practiced in camp shall consist of such tactical movements as cannot be executed in the field, and of the instruction of schools of theoretical instruction for officers and non-commissioned officers.
