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RAILROAD INTERESTS.

RAILROAD INTERESTS. THE NORTHERN PACIFIC'S MOTION DENIED.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Acting Secretary Malloy to-day denied the motion filed by the Northern Pacific Railroad Company asking a review and reversal of the department decision of August 15, 1887, in the matter of restoring to the public domain land heretofore withdrawn for indemnity purposes under the grant. It is alleged by counsel for the company that the Secretary erred in denying to the company the right to select indemnity lands outside of the States of Oregon and Washington in which the land was surveyed, and in denying that the joint resolution of May 31, 1870, established a second and additional indemnity belt beyond the first. Upon the first point the Acting Secretary says that the language of the granting act in this case does not differ from that of nearly all the land grant Company's acts for similar purposes, and which have been decided over and over again by the Supreme Court to be in favor of the Government. It is the duty of the Secretary to select lands for the ascertained losses within other prescribed limits to the extent that they may be found available. As to the second point the Acting Secretary says:
