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CHINESE HIGHSEAS PROMPTLY SHOT

A CONSPIRACY SUPPRESSED IN THE BRITISH STRAITS SETTLEMENTS. San Francisco, Oct. 4 (Special).—The Canadian Pacific steamer which reached Vancouver on Wednesday brings mail intelligence from Sarawak, the British colony in Borneo, that summary vengeance had been meted out to a Chinese secret society which recently decreed death to all non-members.

AN EXECUTRIX ACCUSED OF EMBEZZLEMENT. Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 4 (Special).—Mrs. Fannie B. Moore, widow of insurance Commissioner Moore, and now living in New-York City, seems to be in a serious trouble that was indicated in her arrest for contempt of court in failing to report to the Probate Court, as executrix of her husband's estate, the creditors of Colonel Morris's estate to-day caused the issue of a new citation commanding the widow to show cause in court this afternoon why she should not be removed as executrix.

A SUSPECTED MURDERER SHOT DEAD. Mobile, Ala., Oct. 4.—A dispatch to "The Register" says that the negro stark, who is believed to have been the man who fired into a church at Moss Point on Wednesday night, killing a respectable citizen named Dr. K. Meines, mortally wounding his daughter and seriously wounding Henry Blinn, was found to-day hanging from the gallows in the State Prison.

DISTRIBUTING THE CROCKER ESTATE. San Francisco, Oct. 4 (Special).—The \$2,400,000 estate of Charles Crocker, Vice-President of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, was distributed to-day among his heirs. About \$1,000,000 had previously been paid to different legatees.

THOUGHT TO HAVE BEEN KILLED IN A FIGHT. Cleveland, Oct. 4.—The dead body of George Kranks, age twenty-three, was found in the street at Akron this morning. There was a bullet wound in the abdomen, and the face was badly bruised.

TWO PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS PRESENTED.—THE REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD.—READ—URGING THE ERECTION OF A HEADQUARTERS—EFFECT OF THE PRAYER-BOOK REVISION. The Episcopal General Convention yesterday received a number of petitions and memorials and referred them to the appropriate committees.

FATAL WRECK OF A CONSTRUCTION TRAIN.—DISASTERS ON TWO OTHER ROADS. Indianapolis, Oct. 4 (Special).—Information has reached here of a wreck that occurred on the new Elmer and Richmond Railway, ten miles north of Shoals.

A \$15,000 TROTTER KILLED. East St. Louis, Ill., Oct. 4.—Four men were seriously injured in a freight-train wreck last night, and the trotter Lady Gay, valued at \$15,000, was killed.

PATROL RAILWAY COLLISION IN GERMANY. Berlin, Oct. 4.—A collision occurred to-day between a passenger and a freight train at Lasswitz, in Posen. Four railway officials who were on the passenger train were killed, and many of the passengers were injured.

SUB-CONTRACTOR SULLIVAN ARRESTED. THE SAME CHARGE AGAINST HIM AS AGAINST SNAITH—GIVING \$50,000 BAIL. Albany, Oct. 4.—Timothy J. Sullivan, John Smith's sub-contractor on the Assembly ceiling and staircase contract, was arrested this morning on an order granted by Judge Merwin at Utica last Friday.

KILLED BY DYNAMITE IN CALUMET AND HECLA. Houghton, Mich., Oct. 4.—Two men were instantly killed, another was fatally injured and about twenty more or less hurt at the bottom of the Calumet and Hecla preponderant shaft yesterday.

VIRGINIA NOT LIABLE FOR THE \$40,000. Pittsburgh, Oct. 4.—Governor Francis H. Pierpont of Virginia, who is in the city, said to-day about the report in recent dispatches that the Federal Government claimed \$40,000 from Virginia.

TRYING TWO CONVICTS FOR MURDER. Chicago, Oct. 4 (Special).—Robert Russell and Michael Foy were brought to this city to-day for Joliet penitentiary on writs of habeas corpus issued by Judge Baker.

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS. MEMBERS OF THE CONVENTION TELL ABOUT THE DIFFERENT STATES—STANDING COMMITTEES APPOINTED. Holy Communion was celebrated in St. George's Church at 7:30 a. m. yesterday, and at 9 o'clock Morning Prayer was attended by a large congregation.

The Board, at its meeting in October, 1888, having considered the report of the Board of Bishops, and the House of Deputies, and believing that it was necessary to provide a missionary headquarters, would meet on the 10th inst. at 10 o'clock a. m. to advance the interests of all our missionary work, and to adopt the following with unanimity and enthusiasm:

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NO LIMIT TO THE NUMBER OF TRUSTEES. Albany, N. Y., Oct. 4.—Attorney-General Tabor, in an opinion given to-day, holds that the trustees of a trust company, upon receiving the consent of the superintendent of the Banking Department, may, by resolution, increase their number indefinitely, even if in excess of the twenty-four mentioned in section one of the Trust Company Act.

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
