THEY THOUGHT IT A RUSSIAN PLOT.

REMARKABLE STORY TOLD BY SOCIALISTS—AN ALLEGED SYSTEM OF FORGERY.

Alleged Russian Nihilists, Russian forgers, secret societies, "political pills," Russian police spies and socialists make up the dramatic personnel of a sensational story which came to light yesterday through the efforts of L. Miller, proprietor of the Russian Nihilist paper, "Zuamaia"; Mr. Hillkowitz, general organizer of the Russian Socialists of this city, and Sergius E. Shevitch. According to their story a man representing himself as a stamp agent called on Mr. Miller, in his office, at No. 236 Madison-st., showed him the copy of a physician's diploma granted by the University of Moscow, to Abel Segalowitz, and asked if it could be reproduced in the office of the "Zuamaia."

When the agent returned with the original certificate or diploma, Mr. Miller said he could not treat with him, but would have to see the principal in the transaction, and made an appointment to meet them at his home, No. 177 Montrose-st., the next evening.

When the time for the meeting came Mr. Miller had everything arranged, and while he talked Mr. Hillkowitz took notes at a desk behind a curtain in a doorway.

The man introduced by the stamp agent at Mr. Miller's house as the principal in the transaction represented himself as "Felix" in the conversation which followed. Mr. Miller learned from the alleged rascal that he was a member of a company of Russians whose sole business it was to forge documents to order and bogus Louisiana Lottery tickets, and that they made a deal of money.

Mr. Miller also told that if he would join the "gang" and reproduce the socialists and nihilists alone and reproduce the diplomas he would soon become a rich man. To all arguments of the two men to persuade him to join the "gang" Mr. Miller answered that he must know the man who he did about the methods and men in the secret society and insisted that they tell him the name of the society, who was formerly a noted forger leader of the society, who was formerly a noted forger in Moscow, but had been forced to leave the country.

When Miller asked the name of the "gang" because of the risk of discovery, and said he did not care if he was arrested, the two men assured him and lots of the "gang" had a strong political pull and that they influenced with high Tammany officers, and they mentioned instances where members of the society had been saved from prosecution on account of this self-same "pull."
