

HONORED BY THE EMPEROR. MINISTER VON BOETTICHER RECEIVES A DECORATION.

EMPEROR WILLIAM RESOLVED TO PERSIST IN THE SOCIAL REFORM MOVEMENT—DEDICATING AN IMPERIAL TOMB.

Berlin, March 9.—To mark the anniversary of the death of his grandfather, Emperor William I, the Emperor today sent an aide-de-camp to Herr von Boetticher, the Minister of the Interior, with the decoration of the Order of the Black Eagle.

The incident is much remarked in connection with the rumors that Herr von Boetticher will succeed Baron von Bismarck in the office of Chancellor of the Empire.
