PRINCETON.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE PLACE OF BIBLE INSTRUCTION. Princeton, N. J., Jan. 25 (Special).—Biblical instruction has always been an important factor in the Princeton curriculum. JOHNS HOPKINS.

CLARK UNIVERSITY.

Worcester, Mass., Jan. 25 (Special).—The important incidents in Clark University, of the last few weeks, have been first of all the death of one of the trustees, Judge Charles Devereux, whose interest in the university was strong and deep; the publication of the first number of an educational journal, "The Pedagogical Seminary," addressed exclusively to trustees, college and university presidents, and professors of education, covering the field of higher education chiefly, and strictly international in its character.

IN THE LOCAL COLLEGES.

CHANGES FOR COLUMBIA. It is whispered at Columbia College that some radical changes may be expected before long in the school of Arts. Nothing definite has been announced, but it is known that the University Council has had a number of changes for various departments.

There are a number of men in the faculty who are excellent biblical instructors, but under the present system of dividing the whole body of students into classes it has become difficult to supply each class from among the faculty. In view of these facts, an entire change in the present system is contemplated.

Professor Woodrow Wilson has announced that he will offer two elective courses in political economy for the juniors. The new courses are "Administration," which appears in the curriculum for the first time, and the "History of American Constitutional Law."

Dr. H. A. Todd, associate in the romance languages, will give a series of readings and lectures on January 27, 28, and 29, in the evening, on the subject of "The Romance of the Middle Ages."

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WESTLIAN. Middletown, Jan. 25 (Special).—The annual meeting of the Westlian Alumni Association, held at the Middletown House, George Moore, '82, acted as toastmaster.

YONKON. Schenectady, N. Y., Jan. 25 (Special).—The rehearsal for the opera to be given by the students to secure funds for the Yonkon purposes was well started.
