

AFFAIRS IN BROOKLYN.

DISCUSSING THE TROLLEY SYSTEM. ANOTHER MEETING OF THE STATE BOARD OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS.

The State Board of Railroad Commissioners held a session in the New-York Chamber of Commerce yesterday to listen to arguments by the Atlantic Avenue Street Railway Company of Brooklyn, on the one hand, and the owners of abutting property, on the other, as to the sufficiency of the consents obtained by the railway company in the matter of changing the route of the trolley.

There is so much eccentricity associated with the calls of meetings of the board, as to places and hours and objects, the board being essentially a migratory body, that it is difficult to keep on the scent while it is warm. On the adjournment of the hearing in this city last week, in the case of General Slocom's electric road, it was announced that the argument on the law points would be heard in Albany on Tuesday last.

Then came the announcement that the Board would sit in New-York on Wednesday to hear the Atlantic Ave. case. When the meeting assembled, however, it was the Slocom case that was found to be on. Mr. Dykman, representing the Slocom road, was there. So was Assistant Corporation Counsel Salmon, but the latter appeared to be in doubt before the meeting as to whether the Slocom case or the Atlantic Ave. case was to be heard.
