Bestie Chapman, of No. 218 West Twenty-eighth-st., who was arrested on Monday night by Detectives Valley and Durnan, was sent to the House of Detention yesterday morning by Judge Grady, at the Tombs Police Court. Miss Chapman, who is a dressmaker, is the woman with whom Detective Carey was talking on Thursday night before he received the fatal shot from the revolver in the hands of James D. Blanchette. Miss Chapman will be one of the chief witnesses against the murderer.

The dynamite vessel Vesuvius returned to the Navy Yard yesterday from Charleston, where she took part in the celebration last week.

John A. Kelly, twenty-two years old, of No. 73 Third Place, Brooklyn, was held in default of \$2,000 bail on a charge of robbery by Justice Hogan in the Essex Market Police Court yesterday. Monday night he knocked down and robbed Bernard Eisenberg, of No. 140 West-st., Brooklyn, of a silver watch at Grand-st. and the Bowery. Detective Smith, of the Eleventh Precinct, arrested the prisoner after a lively chase.

Richard McGowan, thirty years old, of No. 36 Bowery, was stabbed in the left side last night, in front of No. 6 Dorset-st., by Edward Keller, who escaped. McGowan was sent to Chambers Street Hospital.

The funeral of Thomas Englen, a retired merchant and broker of this city, took place yesterday morning at the Church of the Ascension. The pastor of the church, the Rev. J. Webster Donald, officiated, as stated by the Rev. D. A. Huntington, of Grace Church. The burial was at Woodlawn Cemetery.

FROM HOTEL TO HOSPITAL.

A WOMAN WHO SAYS SHE IS THE DAUGHTER OF A UNION GENERAL HAS DELIRIUM TRENENS AT THE GRAND UNION.

A tall, handsomely dressed woman entered the office of the Grand Union Hotel a little more than a week ago and asked for a suite of rooms. Three rooms were allotted to her, and she registered as "M. A. Graves, New York." Her appearance indicated the possession of considerable wealth. Diamonds sparkled in her ears, around her neck and on her fingers. Her once-beautiful face was seared with the marks of distipation, and no one in the office was particularly surprised when, five minutes after she had reached her room, she ordered a bottle of whiskey. From then on she drank whiskey or brandy almost without cessation, and nearly two days had remained in bed, trembling and shaking with the preliminary symptoms of delirium tremens. Just before midnight on Monday the hall porter, walking through the corridor of the third floor, noticed a strong smell of gas coming through the transom of her bedroom door. He knocked vigorously, and Mrs. Graves opened the door. The porter saw that the gas burner in the room was turned full on. "All right," she said. "It was an accident." An hour later the porter, passing the room for the second time, again noticed the smell of gas, and called to Mrs. Graves, who turned off the flow of gas. A third time the porter found the gas turned on, and it was decided to watch Mrs. Graves until yesterday morning, when Dr. J. V. D. Young, the hotel physician, examined her and found that she was suffering from alcoholic insanity. She was taken to Bellevue Hospital in an ambulance, and while on the way to the hospital she said that her father was Alexander Austin Cooper, a general in the Union Army during the war. At the hospital she said that her husband had died several years ago, and that she had been swindled out of a large sum of money by a man whose name she would not give, and that Herbert Dixon, a lawyer who lived at No. 12 Gramercy Park, had charge of her affairs. Now she lies in the alcoholic ward at Bellevue Hospital.

PATRIOTIC FEUD IN TENNESSEE.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Nov. 8.—A dispatch to "The Chattanooga Times" from Melvin, Blount County, says that a fight took place to-day between the Swafford and Tollette families with fatal results. Two of the Swaffords, father and son, and one of the Tollettes were killed. Two other persons were seriously wounded. The fight was the result of a long-standing feud between the families.
