BOLD BURGLARS ROB A SAFE.

THEY "HOLD UP" THE BARTENDER, TAKE THE MONEY AND ESCAPE.

Two burglars entered the liquor shop of Henry Osterman, at No. 18 Broadway, at an early hour yesterday morning, and after "holding up" the bartender, Leonard Dreichhardt, for fully an hour, robbed the safe of \$900 in money and a diamond pin, valued at \$250.

THE GRAND JURY MUST MAINTAIN SECRECY.

The fact that the indictments found by the January Grand Jury against thirty-four city and county officials and contractors may be dismissed for technical irregularities in the finding of them, and that the cases may come before the February Grand Jury, led interest to a special charge given to the Grand Jury by Judge Moore yesterday.

THE BROOKLYN CITY RAILROAD COMPANY REPEATED ITS OFFER OF \$250,000 FOR FRANCHISES FOR CERTAIN STREETS IN WHICH TO EXTEND ITS STREET-CAR LINES.

The Brooklyn City Railroad Company repeated its offer of \$250,000 for franchises for certain streets in which to extend its street-car lines yesterday. In a different form, to the Board of Aldermen. The new terms are \$150,000 for the streets in its application which are covered by a similar application by the Kings County Electric Company, and \$100,000 for the routes not asked for by that company but included in the city Company's recent application.

RECORDED SYNTH. IN GENERAL SESSIONS, HAS DENIED THE MOTION OF W. TRAVERS JEROME THAT THE INDICTMENT AGAINST CHARLES W. GARDNER BE DISMISSED.

The commission appointed in April last to look into the affairs of the Custom House has been holding sessions at intervals ever since then.
