HE WAS AN ACTIVE WORKER IN THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY AND A SUPPORTER OF SENATOR HILL, A MASON OF HIGH DEGREE AND A BARRELLER. ENTHUSIAST.

Julius Caesar Luley, secretary of the Aqueduct Commission, committed suicide yesterday morning, when his dead body was found in his room, on the fourth floor of No. 34 West Twenty-fifth.

Mr. Luley had been connected with the Aqueduct Commission since 1885, when he became auditor at a salary of \$2,500. When Police Commissioner John C. Sheehan resigned the place of secretary to the Aqueduct Commission in March, 1892, to accept his present office, Mr. Luley was chosen to succeed him.

He was an ardent Mason, and had reached the thirty-third degree. He was also a member of the Mystic Shrine, and a member of the Council of the Lodge of Perfection, Council of the Princes of the Royal Arch Chapter and the Consistory of the City of New York.

He was an active worker in the Democratic Party, and was a member of the Tammany Hall General Committee of the Ninth Assembly District, and belonged also to the Seneca, Sagamore, Tenderloin and Thirteen Clubs.

He had a room at the Hotel Hamilton, No. 34 West Twenty-fifth street, and he was in the habit of going to the office of the Aqueduct Commission, No. 100 Broadway, every day.
