NO END YET TO THE CONFERENCES.

NOTES OF RACING AFFAIRS—A TALK WITH J. G. K. LAWRENCE—SAD OFFICERS OF WINTER TRACKS.

James R. Keene and Colonel W. P. Thompson, who represented the stewards of the Jockey Club, yesterday met the committee of members of the Western Turf Congress, consisting of Judge Perkins, of Latonia, Ky.; L. P. Telford, of Lexington, Ky., and Van Kirkman, of Nashville, Tenn.

Some of the members of the Coney Island Executive Committee desire the adoption of the English rule in regard to the active racing officials in every race to be conducted in England.

When asked if he thought the Coney Island Jockey Club would join the movement without giving any more trouble, he said: "Yes, I believe that we shall come to an agreement at the meeting to-morrow afternoon."

"How about duplicate officials for each of the positions to be filled?" was asked. Mr. Lawrence said: "I believe that more than one person should be selected for each of the places to be filled. Supposing we have conflicting dates, what then? You can plainly see the necessity of two or more persons when tracks race in opposition to each other."
