

ANOTHER FIGHT AHEAD.

THE SUGAR SCHEDULE ALMOST SURE TO BE OVERHAULED.

MANAGERS OF THE BILL DECIDE TO ABANDON THE ADMINISTRATIVE FEATURE OF THE BILL—RAPID PROGRESS WITH THE FREE LIST.

Washington, June 19.—The formal admission today on the part of the Senatorial managers of the tariff bill that they will abandon entirely the administrative customs portion of the measure has greatly increased the chances of ending the consideration of the bill by Saturday next.

It has been repeatedly asserted by the representatives of the Finance Committee that it was necessary to give the highest duty to the sugar refiners in order to get the necessary forty-three votes for the bill.

At the same time it has been strenuously denied that there was a single vote in the Senate to be gained by giving the Trust what it wanted or one to be lost if the Trust's demands were not acceded to.

There will be a thorough discussion of this most ingenious paradox. The minority will require that these "seeming" contradictions be explained.

To meet in a way the force of this unanswerable contention, it is now announced that the Democratic managers, when the bill gets in the Senate, will try to appease hostile criticism by dropping the 1-10 of a cent a pound compensatory duty on refined sugar imported from sugar-giving countries.

The greater part of the free list was disposed of today, a large majority of the items leading to no debate whatever.

Mr. Vest (Dem., Mo.) moved to strike out the paragraph from the free list. The McKinley act had made the duty 20 per cent, while for twenty years before the duty had been only 10 per cent.

After further discussion the bill was amended to reduce the duty on matting from 20 per cent to 10 per cent.

Mr. Sherman (Rep., Ohio) called attention to a discrepancy between paragraphs 21 and 48. Paragraph 21 makes the duty on paper 20 per cent, and paragraph 48 makes the duty on the pigments from which ink is made 25 per cent.

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MORE EVIDENCE OF FRAUD. PLATES FOR THE BALLISTIC TEST SECRETLY RE-TREATED.

Washington, June 19.—In prosecuting the investigation of the armor-plate frauds it has been found desirable and necessary to procure from the Navy Department copies of all instructions sent to the inspectors at the works of the Carnegie Steel Company.
