

DROUGHT BROKEN AT LAST.

The grateful effects of rain, while north and south of it the country is brown and arid. These July and August showers did much to prevent the reduction of crop now.

HEAVY RAINS IN THE NORTHWEST.

FOREST FIRES IN WISCONSIN AND MICHIGAN CHECKED—AID FOR THE BURNED-OUT SETTLERS.

Milwaukee, Sept. 8.—Reports from Plainfield, Green Lake, Neeshah, Green Bay, Junction City, Grand Rapids and other cities indicate that the heavy rainfall has broken the drought and effectually quenched forest fires.

Money for the relief of the sufferers in the fire-swept region of Northern Wisconsin is pouring into the State. Colonel William J. Boyle, of Governor Peck's staff, has already received \$2,700.

Cumbersland, Wis., Sept. 8.—The first rain for many weeks fell here last night, checking the progress of the forest fires and relieving present apprehensions.

Rockford, Ill., Sept. 8.—At an early hour this morning lightning began to do damage in this region. Several fires were started, but the loss is not great.

Lyons, Iowa, Sept. 8.—The heaviest rain-storm of the season occurred yesterday. Three miles of track of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road was washed out near here, and a section of the Chicago and Northwestern Millard branch also was washed out.

TOO LATE TO DO MUCH GOOD.

The rain yesterday came too late to do any good to growing crops in Essex and adjoining counties in New Jersey, and only cabbages and celery will be benefited.

Water in Jersey City has never been so bad in quality and scarce in quantity as it has been during the last month. The long-continued drought has caused the Passaic River, which is the source of the water supply for the city, to run extremely low.
