TO MR. MORTON'S NOMINEE. [FROM THE REGULAR CORRESPONDENT OF THE TRIBUNE.] Albany, Feb. 26.—Thomas C. Platt is opposing Governor Morton's wishes in a most surprising way as regards the confirmation of Silas W. Burt as Civil Service Commissioner.

Mr. Platt does not wish any man to be a member of the Board of Civil Service Commissioners who believes in Civil Service Reform and has an expert knowledge of the laws bearing upon that subject. Mr. Burt is objectionable for that reason to Mr. Platt, not to Governor Morton.

Senator Mullin, the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, to-day informed Senator O'Connor, the Republican leader in the Senate, that Governor Morton greatly desired Mr. Burt's confirmation.
