Burges, began the trial of Robert Matthews, otherwise known as "Matthias, the Impostor," charged with murder in having poisoned his friend and benefactor, Elijah Pierson, at their common home in the town of Mount Zion.

More than sixty years have passed since this trial, once famous in the judicial history of the county. Matthias and his dupes had for a long time taken their places in the silent world, and the very story of the imposture had faded from general recollection and knowledge. For many years the old-fashioned and conservative State gazetteer, in mentioning Sing Sing, never State note that the village was remarkable for false prophets; the State prison, and for being the scene of some of the Matthias impostures.
