CRETE IN GERMAN EYES.

ENGLAND CENSURED FOR REFUSING TO CO-OPERATE WITH THE POWERS. ANXIETY OVER THE ITALO-ARABIAN QUESTION. THE KAISER DESIGNS A NEW PICTURE.—BERLIN SOCIAL NOTES.

Berlin, Aug. 8.—Political interest during the week has centered in the insurrection in Crete and means to restore tranquillity in that disturbed island, where the Christians are making a desperate attempt to throw off the yoke of Turkish rule, in which they are being aided by Greeks who desire to see Crete part of the Grecian dominions.

The curious question in all these demonstrations of honor and respect is that nobody seems to understand what his relations to the Chinese Government really are, or whether he has any credentials to present, or is travelling for pleasure or business.

A semi-official statement from St. Petersburg at length announces with some definiteness the itinerary of the czar and his family on their trip to various European cities, a trip that has caused the little conjecture as to its results, as it will be the first time the czar has left Russia since his accession to the throne.

There is some anxiety in Government circles regarding the final decision that will be arrived at by the Italian Government concerning the Abyssinian question. General Baldissera, the commander of the Italian forces in Erythra, has arrived in Rome, and has several conferences with the general Pelloux, Minister of War.

Dr. Fritz Friedmann, who was formerly the lawyer of Baron Kottke, the court master of ceremonies who was implicated in the great scandal that convulsed Berlin society for a long period some time ago, has issued a pamphlet on the scandal.

During his cruise in Northern waters Emperor Wilhelm designed a new allegorical picture on the lines of the notorious "Yellow Peril," which excited so much comment last year, the meaning of which is still a mystery.

The report published a few days ago by the "Vorwärts," the organ of the Socialists, that Professor Mendel, a specialist in mental diseases, when he went to St. Petersburg in response to a summons from the Imperial family, occasioned much comment.

NO CABINET RESIGNATIONS.

SALISBURY'S GOVERNMENT, HOWEVER, IS SERIOUSLY WEAKENED.

FATE OF THE IRISH LAND BILL.—Cecil Rhodes MAY RETURN TO ENGLAND A RUINED MAN.—NEWS NOTES FROM THE CONTINENT.

London, Aug. 8.—The fact that Lord Salisbury took no part in the debate on the Irish Land bill in the House of Lords has caused a great deal of comment in various quarters.

The Hon. Cecil Rhodes, whose connection with the British South Africa Company and its alleged complicity in the Transvaal raid of Dr. Jameson are too well known to need mention here, will undoubtedly shortly be brought to book for the part he took in bringing about an invasion of the territory of a friendly State.

Before the departure of M. Faure to Brittany, on Monday last, approaches were made on his behalf to the English directors of the Suez Canal to get their assent to the appointment of M. Jules Cambon as president of the Suez Canal Company.

A corner in coal, brought about by a combination of all the leading dealers who supply London, is within a few weeks of beginning operations. The capital syndicated is £2,000,000.

AFTER IZMIRLIAN'S RESIGNATION. THE GOVERNMENT HAS GRANTED THE EX-PATRIARCH A PENSION OF £200.

As already explained in The Tribune August 6, when the news of the Patriarch's resignation was received, the Lay Council, mentioned in today's dispatch acted as a Board of Trustees for the Armenian Gregorian Church, and it had never thought of asking for its resignation, though the Turkish Government was anxious to secure it, under the pretence that Monseigneur Izmirlian supported the Armenian cause.

When a firm was conceded, some fears were entertained that the General Assembly might not be as submissive as would be desired; and it was urged that the Church Council should not be elected by it, but chosen from among the aristocracy of the Armenian Gregorians.

That trade was communicated to the Council, which members of the Council never received for these. The Patriarch did not want either to renounce his sympathies for the Armenian cause or to assume the dangerous responsibility of the Council, and he presented his resignation.

YOUNG VAN TASSELL BREAKS INTO THE ARCHITECTURAL IRON WORKS.

FOURTEEN THOUSAND SAID TO BE OUT.

PRESIDENT GOMPERS ADDRESSES THE STRIKERS AT THE WINDSOR THEATRE. The strikers were comparatively quiet on the East Side yesterday, it being the Jewish Sabbath.

The Brotherhood of Tailors held a mass-meeting in the afternoon at the Windsor Theatre. The place was crowded, and on account of the intense heat the tailors sat in their shirt sleeves. More than 1,000 attended the meeting, which was called to order by Henry White, secretary of the Tailors' Garment Workers.

Yesterday morning the girls Hattie Loomis and Lillie Field were brought to the East Twenty-second-st. station. Archer was placed in a line with ten men brought in from the street, and the girls were asked to pass their names and to see if they could identify the man whom they say they saw in Annie Beck's company. They could not do this.

The high rates for money continue and no relaxation in the money market is looked for at present. Foreign bankers report a good demand for sterling loans, but there is general complaint at the quality of the collateral offered.
