SPORTS FOR LABOR DAY

A MORE EXTENSIVE CELEBRATION PLANNED THAN IN PREVIOUS YEARS.

ATHLETIC CONTESTS THAT ARE TO TAKE PLACE AT ULMER PARK AND OTHER PLACES.

Brooklyn will celebrate Labor Day this year more extensively than it has ever done since the holiday was instituted. Manufacturing establishments will be shut down, retail stores will be closed generally, and public works will be at a standstill wherever possible. At Prospect Park the following programme will be given at the popular concert at 120 p. m.

The theatres of Brooklyn, with two exceptions, will have matinee and evening performances. At Sousa's concert at Manhattan Beach Joseph Hallenbeck will sing and the Tyrolean Troubadour will play. "The Star Spangled Banner" will be played with accompaniment, and will close each concert. Rice's Circus Carnival and "Evanelline" will amuse the public, and Pains' "Cuba" will have an extra fireworks display. The Swiss Singing societies' festival will be held in Glendale, and there will be contests at shooting, bowling and other sports.

The third annual reunion of the Catholic Knights of America in Brooklyn and the surrounding places will be held at Ulmer Park in the afternoon and evening. The following games, for which prizes will be offered, will take place in the afternoon: One-mile bicycle race for members of the Catholic Knights of America; one-quarter-mile foot race for members; 100-yard three-legged race for members; 150-yard wheelbarrow race for members; 75-yard dash for young girls under fourteen years of age; 100-yard dash for members; 100-yard potato race for members; 100-yard dash for members weighing over 200 pounds; bowling contests by four members of each branch; shooting match between branches of Brooklyn and New-York City.

Yachting will be well represented among the amusements of Labor Day. The annual fall regatta of the Larchmont Yacht Club will be sailed on Long Island Sound.

The American Model Yachtmen will compete for a trophy of thirty-fourth-st. South Brooklyn. In the baseball field the amateur teams are all expected to improve the day in their usual spirited fashion. The Long Island Amateur League will close its season to-day.

BURGLARS ENTER A CHURCH.

Charles Swanson, a sailor, was arrested on Saturday night on a charge of burglary, and early to-day morning John Samuelson, of No. 72 Columbia-st., was arrested on suspicion of being his accomplice. The burglary was committed at the Swedish Baptist Church, in Dean-st., near Sixth-ave. The burglars broke a pane of glass in a window in the rear of the church. August Erickson, of No. 47 Dean-st., discovered the broken glass and entered the church. He found Swanson and entered the pastor's room, having forced open a closet door, a trunk and a desk. Swanson was afterward arrested by Patrolman Hambert. Both were held.

THREE ARRESTED IN A BANK BUILDING.

At about 3 o'clock yesterday morning Thomas H. Rockwell, the watchman at the Mechanics' Bank, No. 129 Fulton-st., heard footsteps in the office of the Progressive Publishing Company, over the store of the firm. He called the police, and Sergeant Kennedy and Patrolman Murphy accompanied him to the building. After a short search they found three men in the office of the publishing company, who were arrested and taken to the Adams-st. police station. They gave their names as Alfred Bennett, of No. 10 Adams-st.; William McNulty, of No. 26 Adams-st.; and Charles J. O'Connell, of No. 26 Adams-st. They were charged with breaking into the office of the Progressive Publishing Company, and with stealing jewelry, watches and other articles. They were held in the Adams-st. station.

SAID THE HARNESS WAS GIVEN TO HIM.

Detective Miller of the Ralph-ave. police station yesterday arrested Frank Malone, twelve years old, while trying to dispose of a set of harness which had been stolen from Christian Ludwig's stable at No. 82 Lexington-ave. The boy, when arrested, had been given to him, but he refused to divulge the person's name. He was turned over to the Children's Society to await trial.

SALVATION ARMY HARVEST FESTIVAL.

The Salvation Army is having a harvest thanksgiving festival, which began on Saturday and will end to-morrow. There are ten corps in the Brooklyn army, of which two are German and three are Swedish. At the headquarters in Washington-st., a generous supply of flowers, fruit, corn, etc., is on hand, and to-day, Tuesday and Wednesday there will be a sale of these harvest gifts. The proceeds are to go toward defraying the general expenses of the army in Brooklyn. The sale will be continued in the daytime as well as in the evening. At No. 221 Washington-st., which is the headquarters of the Corps No. 2, there were special meetings yesterday, at which Ensign Kimball, of the staff of the headquarters, was the principal speaker. This division is in charge of Captain Higgs, one of the most enthusiastic of the army's women officers.

MISSIONS FEEL THE STRAIN.

RELIGIOUS WORK HAMPERED BY THE THREAT OF FREE SILVER.

MRS. S. L. BALDWIN TELLS HOW THE BRIGHTENING EFFECT OF A POSSIBLE DEPRECIATION OF THE CURRENCY IS FELT BY THE CHURCHES.

Not only are all the charitable institutions suffering from the scare caused by the precipitation of the free-silver threat into this campaign, but the missionary societies are feeling the money stringency severely, as they find it almost impossible to get anywhere near their usual amount of contributions.

"I have a pretty good idea how silver monometallic works, as I lived in China for about twenty years and have visited India, both of which countries are on a silver basis. In China the silver dollar was used as the Mexican dollar, the principal coin of another silver nation. I used to give my cook a Mexican dollar to go out and market with, and each day the amount of Chinese money he could get in exchange for the amount of goods he could buy differed. In India the native rupee is used, and this fluctuates even more than the Chinese money.

"The money stringency and silver agitation have been so serious to our General Board that at its annual meeting in Denver last year it was obliged to appropriate \$25,000 more for salaries, not because salaries had increased or there were more salaries to pay, but because the purchasing power of silver money had decreased to that amount.

"We are feeling the uncertainty that the free-silver agitation has caused in the size of gifts we are receiving. For instance, in the New-York State branch we are much worried for fear we cannot raise the \$50,000 that we are expected to reach every year for the cause. Our next meeting will be held in Jamestown on October 12. The present situation is our one worry. I lie awake nights thinking of it. The General Board is in debt \$100,000, but they all tell us there is no hope of improvement until after the election.

PILLARS OF THE CHURCH.

THE REV. OTHO F. BARTHOLOEW'S SERMON ON "LIFE AS A BATTLE-FIELD AND A FIELD FOR CHRISTIAN WORK."

The Rev. Otho F. Bartholow, pastor of the Fleet Street Methodist Church, preached last night on "Life as a Battle-field and a Field for Christian Work." He said in part:

"Life is not only a battle, but a continual building. Our Lord reigns in a place where we must wage war, and a place where we must build character. He holds rewards out to us, so that we may be incited to continue the battle through our lives. He holds out to one who is both a fighter and a builder this glorious prospect—that he shall be a pillar in the Church of God. There were pillars in olden times much more elaborate than in our day. The whole thing was more a subject of study than of modern man's support, but included that which was monumental. Cleopatra's Needle would have been called a pillar; the great statues of the emperors in St. Peter'sburg and Berlin would have been called pillars.
