

THE PROSPECT IN HAMBURG. DOCKS AND HARBOR PRESENT A MORE ACTIVE APPEARANCE.

EXPLOSION OF TOM MANN—THE WAREHOUSE COMPANY OF BREMEN OFFERS TO COMPROMISE—WILL ENGLISH LONGSHOREMEN STRIKE?—A RIOT IN LONDON.

Hamburg, Nov. 27.—The docks and harbor presented a more active appearance to-day, owing to the fact that more work was being performed than has been done since the strike.

A meeting of the Dock Trades Union was held at the Senate of Hamburg against the extension of Tom Mann, the English pulper agitator, who was arrested as he was seeking to enter Hamburg territory, and was placed on board a steamer bound for England.

WEYLER AGAIN IN THE FIELD. HE WILL PURSUE A POLICY OF UNCEASING ACTIVITY AGAINST MACCO.

A NEWSPAPER CORRESPONDENT ARRESTED—MORTALITY AND DISEASE AMONG SPANISH TROOPS—SANGULLY'S NEW TRIAL—ANOTHER REGIMENT OF CAVALRY FOR CUBA.

Havana, Nov. 27.—Captain-General Weyler left Havana at 12:30 o'clock this morning for Mariel on board the transport Legazpi. He has already arrived safely in Artemisa. He was accompanied by his chief of staff and adjutant. The other members of the general staff left Havana by train this forenoon for Artemisa.

General Weyler returns to the province of Pinar del Rio for the purpose of renewing the campaign against the insurgent forces of Macco in that province, which was begun under his personal command a fortnight ago. It is understood here that it is the intention of the Captain-General to pursue a policy of unceasing activity against the rebels to the end of completely breaking up Macco's army before returning to Havana.

A newspaper correspondent named Pendleton was arrested on board the steamer Aransas by the chief of the Havana police yesterday, and taken ashore five minutes before the vessel sailed. It was said that Pendleton was the bearer of contraband news, but the authorities assert that his passport was irregular.

The official statistics show that there are now 17,340 soldiers sick in the various military hospitals. Of this number 1,458 are suffering with yellow fever. The mortality is said to be 163 per thousand.

One hundred and fifty persons who have been condemned for various political crimes and sentenced to exile will be sent to the penal settlement at Fernando Po and the Chafarinas tomorrow.

The case of Julio Sangully, the American citizen who is charged with conspiracy against the Government, was called in the Supreme Court yesterday. The Judge said that the trial would take place in public on December 21, and the witnesses have been summoned to be present on that date.

Sangully was arrested in 1895, and was convicted by a court-martial, which sentenced him to a term of imprisonment. He succeeded, however, in having a civil trial granted to him. A train which arrived here to-day from Artemisa, Province of Pinar del Rio, brought seven officers and 483 privates, who are so ill that it was necessary to bring them here for hospital treatment. The steamer Bolivar brought to-day seven officers and 240 privates, all ill, from the same province.

General Weyler has made an urgent request for a regiment of cavalry, and these troops will sail for Cuba on December 2.

A dispatch from Madrid says: "General Weyler, replying to a memorial addressed to him by a committee of Cuban farmers, informed the memorialists that he could not authorize the farmers of Cuba to grow crops in any part of the island."

Members of the Junta here arrested. Havana, Nov. 27.—The police here have arrested fourteen persons on the charge of being rebel sympathizers. Among the prisoners are two delegates of the Cuban Junta in New York. All the men will be deported to-morrow to Fernando Po and the Chafarinas.

Reinforcements for Manila. Barcelona, Nov. 27.—A steamer sailing hence to-day for Manila carried two battalions of troops to reinforce the Spanish columns operating against the insurgents in the Philippine Islands. She also carried a quantity of war material.
