LIKELY TO BE SOLID. BROOKLYN'S DELEGATES EXPECTED TO FAVOR A UNION CANDIDATE.

THE REPUBLICAN MAJORITY CONVENTION WILL NOT BE DOMINATED BY SENATOR PLATT IF JACOB WORTH CAN PREVENT IT—AN ALLIANCE WITH GOVERNOR BLACK POSSIBLE.

SHOT DOWN IN HIS STORE. A BAYONETTE MAN MURDERED BECAUSE HE REFUSED TO VACATE HIS PLACE OF BUSINESS.

John Sauerber, the proprietor of a delicatessen store at No. 68 Avenue D, Bayonne, was fatally shot in his place of business yesterday morning by James Marks, Jr., the son of the former owner of the building.

Sauerber was alone in his store just before 10 o'clock, when the street door opened and Marks entered. The storekeeper, who had been cutting some meat, paused with a carving-knife in his hand, and greeted his visitor.

Marks, who was in the habit of coming to the store to deliver up immediate possession of the premises, Marks insisted that, as his father's only son and namesake, he was the owner of the property, and it was his desire that Sauerber should vacate, because the storekeeper had paid no rent to him.

Sauerber bore the abusive language of Marks for a time and then ordered him to leave the store. To emphasize his demands, and, if necessary, to enforce them, he walked from behind the counter toward Marks, who in the excitement forgot that he held a knife in his hand.

Among those who saw Marks shoot Sauerber was the latter's sister-in-law, who went to the front window of the store to see who was causing the disturbance. John S. Haver and a teamster, who were driving by the store, also witnessed the shooting.
