TRAINS STILL IN THE DREIFTS. THREE HELD FAST UNDER SNOW AND ICE NEAR RIVERHEAD, LONG ISLAND.

SNOW PLOUGHS CATCHED BEHIND THEM AND USING LESS—THE PASSENGERS BEING SUPPLIED WITH PROVISIONS FROM THE NEIGHBORING FARMHOUSES UNTIL THE CARS CAN BE DUG OUT.

Riverhead, Long Island, Feb. 2.—Three trains and three snow ploughs, with seven or eight engines, are stalled between this point and Greenvale.

What is most galling to the railroad people is that behind the imprisoned westbound train there is the most powerful snow plough on the line, powerless to give any aid.

When the plough made its trip the snow was sodder, owing to heavy rain which followed the first fall of snow.

NO SNOW COMING YET.

A PREDICTION BY THE WEATHER BUREAU. REAR REVERSED. THE TEMPERATURE AWAY DOWN, HOWEVER, AND LIKELY TO STAY SO TO-DAY—TRANSIT DIFFICULTIES TARDILY OVERCOME AND PROGRESS IN CLEARING THE STREETS SLOW.

Another heavy snowstorm was said to be coming this way by the Weather Bureau officials yesterday morning, but it will not come.

Although the average temperature yesterday was the lowest that has so far been experienced this winter, the day was bright and clear, and free from the conditions which made New-York miserable on the preceding day.

Mr. Dunn's prediction of more snow yesterday filled Commissioner McCartney with woe and dismay. Already he has been forced to spend about \$100,000, and still most of the streets, with the exception of the main thoroughfares, are blocked with snow.

Local traffic was delayed yesterday, but not to any serious extent. Suburbanites were the greatest sufferers in this respect, and were late in reaching the city in the morning.

Telegraphic communication was not restored with Boston and other New-England towns until after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Related trains were reported by all the railroads running into New-York yesterday. The trains, when they did lumber in, came coated with ice and snow, and away off the time schedule.
