TO CONFER WITH THE GOVERNOR.

MR. QUIGG'S COMMITTEE WILL SHOW THE DANGER OF ELECTION FRAUDS IN NEW-YORK.

President Quigg of the Republican County Committee and his committee of seven will go to Albany this morning on the Empire State Express and will have a conference with Governor Black about the danger of election frauds and police interference under Tammany control in this city this fall.

The Governor has made an appointment to meet the committee immediately after the arrival of the train in Albany. The committee and the Governor probably will have luncheon together, and there will be a full discussion of the situation in New-York City.

Mr. Quigg will be the main spokesman for the Republican organization. Other members of the committee are Abraham Gruber, Frederick S. Gibbs, George R. Bidwell, Charles H. Murray, Ernest Hall, John Sabine Smith and Charles S. Tamm.

There appears to be manifested in this latest legislative declaration intent to return to the original plan of one Civil Service Commission for the State.

There will be only one examination, a competitive one for "merit" qualifications solely. One open competitive examination is to be the rule in the cities.

NEW-YORK CITY.

BOAT CAPSIZES IN THE SQUALL.

ONE OF ITS FIVE OCCUPANTS DROWNED—THE OTHERS HAD NARROW ESCAPES. A small flat-bottomed boat capsized in the North River off Seventy-seventh, by the squall which struck the city between 4 and 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and one of the five occupants of the boat was drowned. He was Frank Frappinger, nineteen years old, employed as a "hill boy" by the Bell Line railroad at Twenty-fourth and Thirty-second, and living at No. 34 West Fifty-second.

INDIANA DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.
