MUST WIN DEMOCRATIC VOTES. LEMUEL E. QUIGG, AT A MEETING IN THE XXIVTH ASSEMBLY DISTRICT, SAYS THIS WILL ASSURE VICTORY.

THE DAY'S PROGRAMME.

SPEECHES AT POTSDAM, CANTON AND OGDENSBURG.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Oct. 19.—The Roosevelt party found its streak of good weather slightly marred this morning by a light drizzling rain, which gave indications of spreading over the section through which the party was to pass.

Gouverneur, N. Y., Oct. 19.—There were signs of clearing weather as the train bearing Colonel Roosevelt and his party moved South. The first scheduled stop was Potsdam, and there, through William Weed, a hall had been secured to avoid the inclemency of the weather.

WHAT PATRIOTS WILL VOTE FOR. Evidently the crowd believed that they would hear Colonel Roosevelt speak, but he was hustled away to the hall and there found a large audience. He spoke as follows:

My fellow-citizens: There are two points that are brought vividly before me by your presence to-day in the matter of the position of our own regiment. I find here one of your Methodist pastors, the Rev. Dr. Colt, who came very near going with us as chaplain of the Rough Riders.

APPEAL OF COLORED CLERGYMEN. THEY ASK ALL COLORED VOTERS TO SUPPORT ROOSEVELT AND THE REPUBLICAN TICKET. The colored clergymen of the city have united in an appeal to all colored voters of the city to vote for Colonel Roosevelt and other candidates on the Republican ticket.

COLORED REPUBLICANS GET TO WORK. The Colored Republican Organization held a meeting last night in the hall of the Sons of New York Society, No. 131 West Fifty-third-st., at which two hundred negro voters listened to Republican speeches by orators of their own race.

DEMAND FOR BUTTONS AND PORTRAITS. ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND COPIES OF A FINE PICTURE OF ROOSEVELT ORDERED. The demand for Roosevelt buttons and for portraits of Colonel Roosevelt has been increasing this week in a way that shows how popular the Republican candidate for Governor is with the people.

QUESTIONS BEARING ON PEACE. At Canton at least fifteen hundred people braved the inclement weather with the heavy downpour of rain and cheered the candidate. While Colonel Roosevelt was speaking the rain came down in torrents, but the vast crowd simply stood and got wet while they listened to the speech.

DEMOCRATS WILL NOT DEBATE. At several stations along the route where no stops were scheduled, the Roosevelt party had to face the opposition of the Democrats. At one of the stations where the Democrats were present, they refused to debate with the Roosevelt party.

THE BIDWELL ROUGH RIDERS PARADE. An organization which has been named the Bidwell Rough Riders was recently formed by the active young Republicans of the XIXth Assembly

District, which extends from Sixtieth-st. to Eighty-ninth-st., west of Central Park. The members of the organization Tuesday night paraded up and down the principal streets in the district. They wore hats almost similar to those worn by Colonel Roosevelt's Rough Riders.

STATE POLITICAL NOTES.

The personality of the two candidates for Governor is thus contrasted by "The Watertown Daily Times":

Colonel Roosevelt has a record for good government. Judge Van Wyck has not. Which is likely to give the better government? The man who has always worked for it or the brother of the Tammany Mayor of New-York?

Referring to Judge Van Wyck's political associations "The Buffalo Evening News" remarks: "Remember what Judge Van Wyck says about 'absolute honesty.' And then look at the second name on the Democratic ticket—the one just below the name of Van Wyck's name. Let us mention that name:

For Lieutenant Governor. ELLIOT DANFORTH. For his part in the infamous Dutchess County case, which resulted in giving to the people Mr. Murphy for Senator, Elliot Danforth was heavily fined by the State and the Governor in the State. Judge Van Wyck may mean all he says, but what can the people expect from Elliot Danforth, should he be elected to the position of Lieutenant-Governor? And with Richard Croker and Tammany in command of the Democratic party, if Judge Van Wyck if he should succeed in winning an election?

The necessity for work is being pressed vigorously in the rural sections of the State. "The Ballston Daily Journal" in a recent issue says: "Some of our Republican friends in the rural districts do not seem to be awake to the fact that issues of great importance, both State and National, are at stake in this year's election, and that they must hustle if they are to succeed. It will be a great waste of votes, unless they are most honestly and earnestly urged to do so."

According to "The Oswego Times" Croker has a rubber-stamp Mayor and now he would have a rubber-stamp Governor and a rubber-stamp judiciary.

"The Rochester Post-Express" asks: "Are not the people justified in concluding, in view of these two boresom friends to enslave and to deprive the State of its National Honor, and Danforth, the Senate stealer, that he is an unfit man to place in the Governor's chair?"
