

REBELS CROSS THE BORDER.

FOLLOWERS OF JIMINEZ INVADE SAN DOMINGO FROM HAYTIAN TERRITORY.

Port-au-Prince, Hayti, Aug. 8.—The revolutionary Dominican troops which assembled at Ouanaminthe have crossed the frontier and have taken possession of Dajabon. The garrison at that place retired to Fort Belair, a strategic position commanding the town. The foreign population and the Haytian Consul left the place.

FINANCIAL REFORM IN SAN DOMINGO. PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLIC BURNING OF PAPER MONEY EVERY MONTH.

Santo Domingo, Aug. 8.—The new Government has laid a law before Congress for consideration according to which import dues can be paid in American gold or national silver or paper money, but 20 per cent of the same must be paid in paper money to a special commission named by the Government in the different ports.

COUNSEL PREPARING A COUP.

ARREST OF MERCIER OR CASIMIR-PERIER MAY BE MADE IN COURT. Paris, Aug. 8.—The "Jour" to-day says there are grave contradictions in the evidence of General Mercier and former President Casimir-Perier before the Court of Cassation, and it understands counsel for Dreyfus are preparing a dramatic coup. Counsel propose, when the respective depositions are presented to the court, to charge either General Mercier or M. Casimir-Perier with perjury, under Article No. 127 of the Military Code.

London, Aug. 8.—All the correspondents of the London morning papers at Rennes comment on their impressions upon the discourteous manner in which Colonel Jousaust questioned and bullied Dreyfus, especially regarding his relations with women and his private life.
