CLAFINS SUE TAX COMMISSIONERS. THE COMPANY ASKS FOR AN ORDER TO HAVE THEM ADJUDGED IN CONTEMPT OF COURT.

The H. B. Clafin Company, through its counsel, Gould & Willde, applied to Justice Andrews in the Supreme Court yesterday for an order adjudging Thomas L. Feltner, Edward C. Sheehy, Thomas Patterson and the other members of the Board of Taxes and Assessments of the city of New-York in contempt of court for failure to make a return ordered by the court in a certiorari proceeding instituted against them by the Clafin corporation.

SHERIFF AT THE INDUSTRIAL EXCHANGE. FINED FOR DUMPING SCOW IN THE RIVER.

Albert Randall, captain of a tugboat, and Cornelius Brown, master of a dumping scow, recently convicted on complaint of Lieutenant-Commander John C. Fremont, U. S. N., Supervisor of New-York Harbor, of dumping off Fort-Liberty scow yesterday fined \$250 each by Judge Thomas, in the Criminal Branch of the United States Circuit Court. Appeal will be taken in the case.

HARLEM LEAD PIPE THIEVES CAUGHT. Frank Constantine, eighteen years old, of No. 221 East Eleventh-st., and Frank Salon, seventeen years old, of No. 223 First-ave., were locked up in the West One-hundred-and-twenty-fifth-st. station last night, charged with burglary. They entered the home of George C. Brand, a contracting builder, at No. 1 West One-hundred-and-twenty-fourth-st., last night, while the family and servants were out, and cut out every inch of lead pipe.

WESTCHESTER COUNTY. RYE. The taxpayers of the town of Rye have been invited to attend a meeting to be held to-morrow night in the Rye Lyceum, to consider the question of purchasing land at Rye Beach for a public park.

NEW-ROCHELLE. A special meeting of the Common Council has been called for Friday night to consider the question of improvements which it is desired that the New-York, New-Haven and Hartford Railroad shall make in New-Rochelle. The improvements include a better approach to the station at Mechanic-st., approaches in Centre-ave., in order that the bridge built there several years ago may be put in use, a roadway under the tracks of the main line at Rockdale-ave., opening of the Westchester-ave., and improvements on the Kings Highway, crossing of the suburban line.
