EXPLOSION WRECKS HOUSE

MRS. WILLIAM B. LINDSAY BADLY INJURED—CLEANING LIQUID EXPLODES WHILE BEING USED.

Half an ounce of a new cleaning fluid in a quart of water and the friction of a silk dress that was being cleaned in the liquid caused a most remarkable explosion yesterday morning, in which Mrs. William B. Lindsay, the wife of the city passenger agent of the Erie Railroad, received injuries that are grave.

When the explosion occurred Mrs. Lindsay was seated at the head of the stairs, yesterday morning, to clean a silk skirt. She mixed about half of the new fluid with a quart of water in a basin that is next to the wall of the house.

RESULTS OF THE ELECTIONS.

ENTIRE REPUBLICAN TICKET IN RUTHERFORD SUCCESSFUL—A NUMBER OF CITIZENS' CANDIDATES CHOSEN.

Rutherford, March 13 (Special).—Only half the voters of Rutherford came to the polls to-day, but the Republican ticket won a sweeping victory.

NORTH PLAINFIELD—REPUBLICAN. Plainfield, March 13 (Special).—The borough election in North Plainfield to-day resulted in a Republican victory, with the exception of the election of William E. Mattison (Dem.) as Justice of the Peace by a majority of six votes.

HARD FIGHT IN RARITAN TOWNSHIP. Flemington, March 13 (Special).—The fight in Raritan Township, Flemington, the Democratic stronghold, was at fever heat all day, and the largest vote in years was polled.

REPUBLICAN VICTORY PROBABLE. Asbury Park, March 13.—The indications at a late hour this evening point to the election of the entire Republican ticket in Neptune Township.

PEOPLE'S TICKET WINS IN SEABRIGHT. Long Branch, March 13 (Special).—Seabright to-day had one of the fiercest political battles in its history. It was a poll of a political party.

OUTCOME IN UNION TOWNSHIP. Elizabeth, March 13.—The Republicans of Union Township elected every officer, excepting Assessor, Collector and Freeholder.

DEMOCRATS GAIN IN MORRIS COUNTY. Morristown, March 13.—The Democrats made a gain of three in the Morris County Board of Freeholders at to-day's elections.

UNION TICKET WINS IN SHREWSBURY. Red Bank, March 13 (Special).—The Citizens' ticket in Shrewsbury Township was elected to-day without opposition.
