Washington, March 23.—Secretary Root to-day transmitted to the Senate his reply to the resolution of March 21 requesting information regarding the War Department's practice of granting permits for gold dredging off the Alaskan coast. He says: "No concession or grant to excavate the gold bearing beds of the coast of Alaska or in the vicinity of Cape Nome, in Alaska, or in other Alaskan waters, have been made by the Secretary of War or any other official of the War Department since the applications have been received by the War Department for permits to excavate in the bed of the ocean in the case of Cape Nome, Alaska."
