SAALFIELD-CUTTING CASE REVERSED.

APPELLATE DIVISION DECIDES THE SOUTH FERRY PROPERTY LITIGATION.

The suit brought by Richard A. Saalfield against William Bayard Cutting for \$52,000-\$2,000 for expenses and the remainder for loss in husiness-was acted upon by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court yesterday, when it handed down a decision reversing the order of the lower court and adding \$10 costs and disbursements. Saalfield alleged that he was employed by Cutting to try to dispose of the South Ferry property for a large sum; that he found a purchaser in England, and sum; that he found a purchaser in England, and then found that Cutting had already sold the property. Saaifield made a complaint in the lower court which was not explicit enough, and he was ordered to write another. This was also indefinite, and a third was ordered, which was found also indefinite. The case was then decided in favor of the defendant. Yesterday the order was reversed. Justice Barrett in his decision strikes out various clauses in the complaints of Saalfield. He paid \$8 a week alimony for a year, and his wife then got a warrant, which it took the police a year to serve. Magistrate Crane ordered South-feat to pay her \$8 a week, and in default of bonds he was put in jail.

STEAM DRILL CAUSES LOCKJAW.

He was taken to Bellevue Hospital, where he was treated and discharged as cured. He became violent yesterday, had fits and apasms, and a policeman sent for an ambulance.

E. T. GOLDBERG DISBARRED.

APPELLATE DIVISION SAYS THE REFEREE WAS NOT SEVERE ENOUGH

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court vesterday handed down a decision disbarring E. Townsend Goldberg, an attorney. The opinion of the the accused attorney. The report states that the respondent stands before the Court charged with being guilty of "deceit, malpractice and acts constituting a misdemeanor, as attorney and counsellor at law.

Upon reading the evidence, the opinion says, the Court is strongly impressed with the idea that the referee was very lenient toward the respondent, in deciding that certain charges were not established by sufficient proof. The only charge that the referee says is fully established was that in October, 1898, Goldberg, as attorney for the plaintiff in two actions, procured writs of replevin to be issued against Louis Abrams, de fendant, and took or had taken from Abrams's place of business a large quantity of goods not described in the writs; also that he refused to allow Abrams to take an inventory of the goods and caused them to be delivered at once to the plaintiffs in the replevin actions. The Court says that if Goldberg were guilty of the act specified it amounted to but little less than larceny. The Court decides that, in view of the respond-

ent's previous record, the extreme penalty must be inflicted. He was suspended from practice for two years by the General Term upon charges pre-ferred in 1894. The Appellate Division now says: That the respondent was unworthy of the leniency of the Court is demonstrated. The whole of the record now before us shows that he is incorrigible and defiant in his perversity. He has not only failed to heed the admonition of the Court to redeem himself, but his conduct shows that he is utterly devoid of an understanding or appreciation of the duty and moral responsibility of a member of the profession, and that he is utterly unworthy to belong to it.

A reference in the case was ordered on May 5 last, and on May 12 ex-Judge Charles F. Brown was appointed referee. He presented his report to the Court on January 30 last. W. M. K. Olcott was the prosecuting attorney, and Goldberg appeared in his own behalf.
