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TRINITY LEAVES THE LEAGUE.

WITHDRAWS FROM THE INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETIC ORGANIZATION BECAUSE OF SCHOLARSHIP AMENDMENT.

Trinity, one of the most prominent schools in this city, resigned from the New-York Interscholastic Athletic Association at a special meeting of the league held in Dwight School yesterday.
