

COL. WILLIAMS EXAMINED

DEFENSE IN R. T. CASE TRIES TO SHOW THE FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE COMPANY WAS BAD.

The trial of A. R. Goslin, Eugene L. Packer, James T. Davis and Henry Bogert, one of the company's directors, charged with conspiracy to defraud the price of Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company stock, was resumed yesterday in the Criminal Branch of the Supreme Court...

John Proctor Clarke, who as Special Deputy Attorney-General is conducting the prosecution, objected to the line of examination, but Justice Furman allowed it. Mr. Williams said the only source of income of the Brooklyn Heights Company was its receipts from the operations of the constituent roads...

Justice Furman refused the request to dismiss the charge of conspiracy to defraud. He said the defendants had committed no crime, that they had a perfect right to do what they had done, and that they acted perfectly openly above board, and that they were prepared to show their books and accounts to any one who wished to examine them...

Robert Cuthbert, an expert accountant, said he had examined the books of the Brooklyn Heights Company, and had found the accounts correct. He said the company had a surplus of \$1,500,000, and that the assets of the company were worth \$1,500,000...

DEBATE IN THE FRENCH CHAMBER ON THE NAVAL PROGRAMME.

Paris, June 29.—In the Chamber of Deputies today during the debate on the Government's naval programme the Minister of Marine, M. de Lanesan, replying to criticisms passed upon the various sizes of war vessels contemplated—some members demanding battleships exclusively and others arguing in favor of a series of torpedo boats and submarine vessels only—upheld the Government's scheme, pointing out that France needed battleships to defend the colonies...

CHARLES P. DALY'S ESTATE.

TRANSFER TAX APPRAISER PLACES VALUATION AT \$402,961.34.

Riverhead, Long Island, June 29.—Transfer Tax Appraiser Griffin, of Riverhead, has reported on the estate left by Charles P. Daly and a decree has been entered by Surrogate Pelt. The total of the appraised valuation is \$402,961.34, and the transfer tax amount \$38,418.75. The transfer tax is fixed by the Surrogate at \$5,230.95.

BOYDIES FROM HYDROPHOBIA.

Joseph Boyd, seven years old, died from hydrophobia at his home, No. 157 West End ave., last Friday night. About nine weeks ago he was bitten on the neck of his nose, was bitten on the right wrist by a strange dog. Wednesday afternoon he complained of a severe headache and of thirstiness. Dr. George Gilder, Hamilton Street, put Joseph in bed and administered the ointment to the others. Addresses and a reception followed.

FARMERS ARM TO STOP DAM BUILDING.

Philadelphia, June 29.—A dispatch from Altoona, Pa., says that the farmers of the Quemanong Valley are armed and guarding a point that has been selected by the Cameron Steel Company for the erection of a dam four miles long and having a depth of 75 feet at the breast. The farmers declare that the dam will be a menace to the safety and decrease the value of their lands. The property owners below the proposed dam think they are in no danger of repetition of the Johnstown flood disaster. The clash between the civil engineers and the farmers is expected at any time.

COLLEGE OPENED IN MANILA.

FIRST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION NOT UNDER CONTROL OF THE PRIESTS.

Manila, June 29.—The non-sectarian College of Primary and Secondary Education was opened at Manila today in the presence of Judge Taft, president of the Civil Commission, and of his colleagues. Judge Taft spoke in fitting and effective terms of the significance of the ceremony. The institution is the first educational enterprise in the Philippines that is not under the control of the priests and that looks for support to the voluntary contributions of the people. Five hundred pupils have already been enrolled, and many children are leaving the schools of the priests to enter the college. The American Educational Department supplies textbooks on the easiest possible conditions.

PRISONERS IN GOOD HEALTH.

LIQUORANT PAUL DRAPER DROWNED.

Washington, June 29.—General MacArthur has sent to the War Department the following account of the death of Lieutenant Paul Draper: Manila, June 29.—Second Lieutenant Paul Draper, 2d Infantry, drowned morning June 23, working on ferry near San Antonio, Nueva Ecija, Luzon; body not yet recovered.

FIGHTING IN COLOMBIA.

Kingston, Jamaica, June 29.—A private telegram received here today from Colombia says the situation at Cartagena and Savanilla is very grave, that fighting is proceeding and that the foreign residents are leaving hurriedly.

TRINIDAD'S LOFTY ATTITUDE.

Kingston, Jamaica, June 29.—Inter-liaison news received here today says Trinidad is dissatisfied with the delay in the ratification of the treaty with the United States, and that the Legislative Council has passed a resolution declining to agree to the delay, and setting forth that it considers itself at liberty to make other arrangements.

LIBRARY GATHERING IN LONDON.

London, June 29.—There was a remarkable gathering of literary and artistic Londoners today at a luncheon in the Mansion House given by the Lord Mayor to celebrate the completion of the Dictionary of National Biography. Over two hundred were present, including Mr. Charles, the United States Ambassador; Leslie Stephen, the first editor of the work; Sidney Lee, the present editor; the Bishop of London, the Right Rev. Mandell Creighton, D. D.; John Morley, Sir Charles Dillkham, H. Lecky, Viscount Peel, Sir Clements Markham, Mr. Andrew Lang, Edmund Gosse and Austin Dobson. Speeches were delivered by Mr. Morley, the Lord Mayor, the Bishop of London and others. They all paid tributes to the magnitude of the benefit conferred by the work just completed and made complimentary references to America, caused by Mr. Choate's presence.
