AN EXPLICIT DECLARATION FOR FREE SILVER.

BUT "IMPERIALISM" SAID TO BE THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE—PRINCIPLES ENUNCIATED AT KANSAS CITY.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY PRINCIPLES.

Free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1. Constitution declared to follow the flag. "Imperialism" regarded as the paramount issue. Republican policy in dealing with new possessions denounced. Filipinos must not be citizens, though they are declared to be under the Constitution. Private monopolies condemned; Dingley tariff called a trust breeding measure. Gold standard legislation denounced. National banks denounced. Election of Senators by direct vote of the people. "Government by injunction" opposed. Arbitration as a means of settling labor disputes. Department of Labor favored. Liberal pensions to soldiers and sailors. Nicaragua Canal under American control; the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty denounced. Statehood for Arizona, New-Mexico and Oklahoma; Territorial government for Alaska and Porto Rico. Improvement of arid lands. Enforcement and extension of Chinese exclusion law. Aligned alliance with England denounced; sympathy with the Boers expressed. Shipping Subsidy bill opposed; reduction of war taxes demanded.

FULL TEXT OF THE PLATFORM.

Kansas City, July 5.—Following is the official text of the platform as adopted by the Convention: We, the representatives of the Democratic party of the United States, assembled in Convention on the anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, do reaffirm our faith in that immortal proclamation of the inalienable rights of man and our allegiance to the Constitution framed in harmony therewith by the fathers of the Republic. We hold with the United States Supreme Court that the Declaration of Independence is the spirit of our government, of which the Constitution is the form and letter.

We declare again that all governments instituted among men derive their just powers from the consent of the governed; that any government not based upon the consent of the governed is a tyranny; and that to impose upon any people a government of force is to substitute the methods of imperialism for those of a republic. We hold that the Constitution follows the flag and denounces the doctrine that an Executive or Congress deriving their existence and their powers from the Constitution, can exercise lawful authority beyond it. In violation of it we assert that no nation can long endure half republic and half empire, and we warn the American people that imperialism abroad will lead quickly and inevitably to despotism at home.

We pledge the Democratic party to an unceasing warfare in Nation, State and city against private monopoly in every form. Existing laws against trusts must be enforced and more stringent ones must be enacted providing for publicity as to the affairs of corporations engaged in interstate commerce, and requiring all corporations to show, before doing business outside the State of their origin, that they have no water in their stock, and that they have not attempted and are not attempting to monopolize any branch of business or the production of any articles of merchandise, and the whole constitutional power of Congress over interstate commerce, the mails and all modes of interstate communication shall be exercised by the enactment of comprehensive laws upon the subject of trusts. Tariff laws should be amended by putting the products of trusts upon the free list to prevent monopoly under the plea of protection.

The failure of the present Republican Administration, with an absolute control over all the branches of the National Government, to enact any legislation designed to prevent or even curtail the absorbing power of trusts and illegal combinations, or to enforce the anti-trust laws already on the statute books, proves the insincerity of the high sounding phrases of the Republican platform.

Corporations should be protected in all their rights, and their legitimate interests should be respected, but any attempt by corporations to interfere with the public affairs of the people or to control the sovereignty which creates them should be forbidden under such penalties as will make such attempts impossible.

We condemn the Dingley Tariff law as a trust breeding measure, skillfully devised to give the few favors which they do not desire and to place upon the many burdens which they should not bear.

We favor such an enlargement of the scope of the Interstate Commerce law as will enable the Commission to protect individuals and communities from discriminations and the public from unjust and unfair transportation rates.

We reaffirm and indorse the principles of the National Democratic platform adopted at Chicago in 1896, and we reiterate the demand of that platform for an American financial system made by the American people for themselves, which shall restore and maintain a bimetallic price level and, as part of such system, the immediate restoration of the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of any other nation.

We denounce the currency bill enacted at the last session of Congress as a step forward in the Republican policy which aims to discredit the sovereign right of the National Government to issue all money, whether coin or paper, and to bestow upon National banks the power to issue and control the volume of paper money for their own benefit. A permanent National bank currency, secured by Government bonds, must have a permanent debt to rest upon, and if the bank currency is to increase with population and business the debt must also increase. The Republican currency scheme is therefore a scheme for fastening upon the taxpayers a perpetual and growing debt.

We are opposed to this private corporation paper circulated as money, but without legal tender qualities, and demand the retirement of the National bank notes as fast as this Government paper or silver certificates can be substituted for them.

We favor an amendment to the Federal legislation providing for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people, and we favor direct legislation wherever practicable.

We are opposed to government by injunction; we denounce the blacklist and favor arbitration as a means of settling disputes between corporations and their employees.

In the interest of American labor and the uplifting of the workingman as the cornerstone of the prosperity of our country, we recommend that Congress create a Department of

be governed outside the Constitution and whose people can never become citizens. We are in favor of extending the Republic's influence among the nations, but believe that influence should be extended not by force and violence, but through the persuasive power of a high and honorable example.

The importance of other questions now pending before the American people is in nowise diminished, and the Democratic party takes no backward step from its position on them, but the burning issue of imperialism growing out of the Spanish war involves the very existence of the Republic and the destruction of our free institutions. We regard it as the paramount issue of the campaign.

The declaration in the Republican platform adopted at the Philadelphia Convention held in June, 1900, that the Republican party "steadfastly adheres to the policy announced in the Monroe Doctrine," is manifestly insincere and deceptive. This profession is contradicted by the avowed policy of that party in opposition to the spirit of the Monroe Doctrine to acquire and hold sovereignty over large areas of territory and large numbers of people in the Eastern Hemisphere. We insist on the strict maintenance of the Monroe Doctrine, and in all its integrity, both in letter and in spirit, as necessary to prevent the extension of European authority on this continent, and as essential to our supremacy in American affairs. At the same time we declare that no American people shall ever be held by force in unwilling subjection to European authority.

We oppose militarism. It means conquest abroad and intimidation and oppression at home. It means the strong arm which has ever been fatal to free institutions. It is what millions of our citizens have fled from in Europe. It will impose upon our peace loving people a large standing Army and unnecessary burden of taxation and a constant menace to their liberties. A small standing Army and a well disciplined State militia are amply sufficient in time of peace. This Republic has no place for a vast military service and conscription. When the Nation is in danger the volunteer soldier is his country's best defender.

The National Guard of the United States should ever be cherished in the patriotic hearts of a free people. Such organizations are ever an element of strength and safety. For the first time in our history and coeval with the Philippine conquest has there been a wholesale departure from our time honored and approved system of volunteer organization. We denounce it as un-American, undemocratic and un-republican, and as a subversion of ancient and fixed principles of a free people.

Private monopolies are indefensible and intolerable. They destroy competition, control the price of all material and of the finished product, thus robbing both producer and consumer. They lessen the employment of labor and arbitrarily fix the terms and conditions thereof, and deprive individual energy and small capital of their opportunity for betterment.

They are the most efficient means yet devised for appropriating the fruits of industry to the benefit of the few at the expense of the many, and unless their insatiable greed is checked all wealth will be aggregated in a few hands and the Republic destroyed. The dishonest paltering with the trust evil by the Republican party in State and National platforms is conclusive proof of the truth of the charge that trusts are the legitimate product of Republican policies, that they are fostered by Republican laws and that they are protected by the Republican Administration in return for campaign subscriptions and political support.

We pledge the Democratic party to an unceasing warfare in Nation, State and city against private monopoly in every form. Existing laws against trusts must be enforced and more stringent ones must be enacted providing for publicity as to the affairs of corporations engaged in interstate commerce, and requiring all corporations to show, before doing business outside the State of their origin, that they have no water in their stock, and that they have not attempted and are not attempting to monopolize any branch of business or the production of any articles of merchandise, and the whole constitutional power of Congress over interstate commerce, the mails and all modes of interstate communication shall be exercised by the enactment of comprehensive laws upon the subject of trusts. 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In the interest of American labor and the uplifting of the workingman as the cornerstone of the prosperity of our country, we recommend that Congress create a Department of

Labor, in charge of a Secretary with a seat in the Cabinet, believing that the elevation of the American laborer will bring with it increased production and increased prosperity to our country at home and our commerce abroad.

We are proud of the courage and fidelity of the American soldiers and sailors in all our wars; we favor liberal pensions to them and their dependants, and we reiterate the position taken in the Chicago platform in 1896 that the fact of enlistment and service shall be deemed conclusive evidence against disease and disability before enlistment.

We favor the immediate construction, ownership and control of the Nicaragua Canal by the United States, and we denounce the insincerity of the plank in the Republican platform for an Isthmian canal in face of the failure of the Republican majority to pass the bill pending in Congress.

We condemn the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty as a surrender of American rights and interests not to be tolerated by the American people. We denounce the failure of the Republican party to carry out its pledges to grant Statehood to the Territories of Arizona, New-Mexico and Oklahoma, and we promise the people of those Territories immediate Statehood and home rule during their condition as Territories, and we favor home rule and a territorial form of government for Alaska and Porto Rico.

We favor an intelligent system of improving the arid lands of the West, storing the waters for purposes of irrigation, and the holding of such lands for actual settlers.

We favor the continuance and strict enforcement of the Chinese Exclusion law and its application to the same classes of all Asiatic races.

Jefferson said: "Peace, commerce and honest friendship with all nations, entangling alliances with none." We approve this wholesome doctrine and earnestly protest against the Republican departure which has involved us in so-called world politics, including the diplomacy of Europe and the intrigue and land grabbing of Asia, and we especially condemn the ill concealed Republican alliance with England, which must mean discrimination against our friendly nations, and which has already stifled the Nation's voice while liberty is being strangled in Africa.

Believing in the principles of self-government, and rejecting, as did our forefathers, the claim of monarchy, we view with indignation the purpose of England to overwhelm with force the South African Republic. Speaking, as we do, for the entire American Nation, except its Republican office holders, and for all free men everywhere, we extend our sympathies to the heroic burghers in their unequal struggle to maintain their liberty and independence.

We denounce the lavish appropriations of recent Republican Congresses, which have kept taxes high and which threaten trade perpetuation of the oppressive war levies. We oppose the accumulation of a surplus to be squandered in such barefaced frauds upon the taxpayers as the Shipping Subsidy Bill, which, under the false pretense of prospering American shipbuilding, would put unearned millions into the pockets of the favored contributors to the Republican campaign fund. We favor the reduction and speedy repeal of the war taxes and a return to the time honored Democratic policy of strict economy of Government expenditures.

Believing that our most cherished institutions are in great peril, that the very existence of our constitutional Republic is at stake, and that the decision now to be rendered will determine whether or not our children are to enjoy those blessed privileges of free government which have made the United States great, prosperous and honored, we earnestly ask for the foregoing declaration of principles the hearty support of the liberty loving American people, regardless of previous party affiliations.

A SESSION OF SPEECHES.

AWAITING THE PLATFORM. THE CONVENTION HAS LONG TALKS.

GOVERNOR HOGG, CONGRESSMAN DOCKEY, MAYOR ROSE, GOVERNOR BECKHAM, AND J. W. MILES, LISTENED TO BY DELEGATES.

Convention Hall, Kansas City, Mo., July 5.—Convention Hall was again besieged to-day by eager and excited thousands, and long before the time set for opening the second day's proceedings of the Convention all of the streets approaching the building were solidly massed with humanity, moving forward to the main entrance. Expectancy was at a high pitch, as it was universally felt that the day had in store the great events of the Convention.

By ten o'clock, thirty minutes before the time set for the opening of the Convention, nearly every seat in the galleries was occupied.

The delegates were much more deliberate, and came in slowly. The word had gone abroad that there would be a fight on the floor over the adoption of the platform, and anticipating a session which would be long and tiring after it had once begun they preferred to come only at the last minute, that their stay in the crowded hall might be made no longer than necessary. The crowd was anxious to see Senator Hill, and on two occasions when a half-headed man came through the door leading to the delegates' seats they set up the cry of "Hill," which had proven so sensational a feature at both sessions yesterday. The Senator, however, was one of the last of the New-York delegation to arrive.

Once the delegates began to put in an appearance they came in streams, and the space reserved for them filled up with great rapidity.

The number of handsomely gowned women around the speakers' seats was even greater than yesterday, and, with their bright colored dresses, ribbons and fluttering fans, they formed a charming background for the high officials of the party, who occupied seats directly in front of them.

The familiar tunes played by the bands in the galleries brought forth the familiar yells of the crowd. As usual "Dixie" and "A Hot Time" were played repeatedly and cheered enthusiastically.

The arrival of Richard Croker called forth a new cheer from the galleries, and the usual war whoop many a man shows up, there was the cry of "Hill," just to remind him that "these are others."

Governor Beckham of Kentucky had an enthusiastic reception as he came in, a large number of delegates crowding around to shake him by the hand.


PRAYER BY BISHOP GLENNAN.
