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SCHOOL SALARIES RAISED.

STILL DISCRIMINATION AGAINST BROOKLYN, BOROUGHS REPRESENTATIVES SAY.

The Board of Education met last night and increased salaries of various employees. The salaries of examiners were raised from \$4,000 to \$5,000 a year, and a number of other employees had their compensation increased.

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
