MAN AND HORSES DEAD-FIVE PER-SONS INJURED.

Trolley cars were responsible for an unusual number of accidents in Brooklyn late on Saturday night and yesterday.

Morrissey lay by the side of the tracks at the end of the station at Coney Island for some time before he was discovered.

Shortly after midnight a soda water wagon, owned by Weyman Brothers, of No. 104 South Eighth-st., was wrecked by a collision with a car in Flatbush.

Frederick Bremmer, of No. 308 Marston-st., the driver of a car, and George Chappel, his helper, of No. 601 Flushing-ave., were both thrown to the ground.

The accident occurred at Nostrand-ave. and Midwood-st. Car No. 473, of the Nostrand-ave. line, was going north at a rapid rate.

The motorman of the car was Thomas Fitzgerald, of No. 100 Bergen-st., and the conductor Frederick Ruby, of No. 613 Gates-ave. No arrests were made.

Patrick Doan, twenty-nine years old, of No. 114 Marston-st., while alighting from Car No. 229 of the Third-ave. line, was thrown about 1 o'clock yesterday morning, fell heavily on his face.

Bertie Sharkoff was another victim of the trolley car who was treated by Dr. Danney at the Seney Hospital.

ITALIANS FIGHT; ONE MAY DIE.

A quarrel over a guitar precipitated a fight among five Italians in South Brooklyn early yesterday morning, with the result that one is lying at the point of death in the Look Island College Hospital.

With the interlude of a quarrel, Sanquetti assumed a threatening aspect. Sanquetti had a warm argument, which ended in a wrestling and short arm pugilistic match.

The Italians in the neighborhood, hearing the shots, swarmed out of the houses. Several policemen were called to the scene.

ANTI-COW ASSOCIATION.

NEW-LOTS CITIZENS ORGANIZE TO RID THEMSELVES OF ROVING MILKERS.
