

THE CITY'S POPULATION. MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX SHOW A LARGE GAIN IN TEN YEARS.

Washington, Aug. 16.—Some disappointment was felt when it was discovered that the population of New York, New York, as revealed to-day by the Census Bureau, gave the statistics of only two of the five boroughs—Manhattan and The Bronx—the latter including the territory annexed on January 1, 1898.

Table showing population statistics for Manhattan and the Bronx in 1890 and 1900, including assembly districts.

The population of Manhattan and the Bronx in 1900, according to Assembly districts, is as follows: MANHATTAN—1,801,662.

The population of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond boroughs, constituting the remainder of Greater New York, will be announced within a few days.

If the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond have increased in population at the same rate as Manhattan and The Bronx, the population of the greater city would approximate 2,848,000.
