INTERNATIONAL ATHLETICS. THE AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION ASKED TO WORK WITH THE FOREIGN ASSOCIATIONS.

The chances are that a movement, which has been on foot for some time, to form an international athletic association will bear fruit. At the time of the recent championship games at Paris representatives from Italy, Greece and other countries called an informal meeting to organize an international association, the idea being to have a uniform set of rules and conditions. As a representative of the Amateur Athletic Union, Mr. Sullivan was invited to the meeting and attended. It was decided that each representative should report to his organization, so that the different athletic bodies would be prepared at some future time to do what they thought advisable.

Pierre Roy, of Paris, who acted as temporary secretary at the preliminary meeting held in that city, has sent a letter to James E. Sullivan, the secretary of the Amateur Athletic Union, asking that the National association work with the foreign associations. Mr. Sullivan communicated with Bartow S. Weeks, the president of the Amateur Athletic Union, and the latter has agreed to have the International Championship held at Buffalo next year in connection with the Pan-American Exposition.

CYCLING. AN AUSTRALIAN SEEKING INFORMATION ABOUT CYCLE PATHS.

H. C. Bagot, of Melbourne, Australia, is in this country at present, and he has done considerable riding on the newly made cycle paths throughout the country. The antiquarian thinks that the cycle paths are great things, and when he returns to his home he will begin an active crusade toward cycle path building in Australia. Mr. Bagot visited M. M. Belding, jr., the chief consul of the League of American Wheelmen of this State yesterday, seeking information regarding the paths. Their comparative small cost and simplicity of construction astonished the Australian. The visiting wheelman absorbed all the information, and will be back in a few months Australia to begin work on cycle paths. Most of the paths in this district are made of a mixture of gravel and sand, with just enough clay to make the path "bind" properly.
