When the charges were preferred the pastor's case was stopped. It is said that he has it in his power to oust the vestry as a body if he sees fit, but it is thought they will resign first. The charges were signed by all the members of the vestry, with one exception. He has remained faithful to the rector throughout. It is reported that one or two other members are not so much opposed to him as they were, and may later rally to his support.
