REPUBLICAN MAJORITIES IN BOTH BRANCHES.

SUBSTANTIAL GAINS IN THE HOUSE—A SOUND MONEY MAJORITY IN THE SENATE.

The indications are that the Republican majority in the next House of Representatives will be no less than forty-one—the poll showing gains in New-York, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Kentucky, thus increasing the majority in the present House by over twenty-five.

The terms of thirty United States Senators will expire on March 3, 1901. There are also vacancies in the Senate's membership from the States of Delaware, Nebraska, Montana, Pennsylvania and Utah.

Forty-two men in line when the polls closed—remarkable pluck of a crippled Republican. Eight hundred and seventy-two voters of the 1008 registered in the Thirty-fourth Election District cast their votes at the polling place in Eighth-ave. near One-hundred-and-thirtieth-st.

THE PRESIDENT VOTES.

At 9 o'clock indicate a plurality for Bryan of 15,000. Benton McMillin (Dem.) is re-elected Governor by 5,000; Walter P. Brownlow (Rep.), Henry R. Gibson (Rep.), John A. Moore (Rep.), Charles E. The Democrats will have a good majority in the Legislature, and will elect E. W. Carmack (Dem.) to the United States Senate.

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San Francisco, Nov. 6.—Incomplete returns from 50 out of 408 precincts in San Francisco give McKinley 657; Bryan, 444. Thirty-two precincts complete out of 2,180 outside of San Francisco give McKinley 744; Bryan, 641. The same precincts in 1896 gave McKinley 863; Bryan, 1,044.

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JUDGE DAY ACCOMPANIES HIM TO THE POLLS—SENATOR HANNA VISITS CANTON.

Canton, Ohio, Nov. 6.—President McKinley cast his ballot at 9:30 o'clock this morning. He was accompanied to the polls by Judge Day, Dr. Rixey, Postmaster Francis Charles Miller, of Canton, and Secretary Cortelyou. The President greeted the knots of people gathered in front of the house and accompanied his hearty handshake with a pleasant personal greeting. Down Market-st. he and Judge Day walked at the head of the party, and the President was kept busy raising his hat to the many greetings along the way.

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At the polling place a crowd had collected. The President shook hands with some of the officials, and then stood while the questions required by law were asked. His registry number was 302, and his was the 19th ballot cast in a total registration of 32. 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RHODE ISLAND IN LINE.

M'KINLEY'S PLURALITY 15,000—TWO REPUBLICANS ELECTED TO CONGRESS.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 6 (Special).—A closely contested city election absorbed much of the interest in election returns. Consequently the city ticket was counted first. From the returns on the Presidential election in at midnight McKinley has carried the State by 15,000. Amendments to the Constitution, abolishing the Newport capital and making State elections biennial in November of the even years, are probably carried. In this city, Granger, Democrat and Good Government, is elected Mayor over Goff, Republican, by 840 plurality. Both Congress districts are strongly Republican, Bull and Capron being re-elected.

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
