

THE LVITH CONGRESS.

LITTLE CHANGE IN HOUSE AND SENATE MAJORITIES.

REPUBLICANS WILL CONTROL THE UPPER HOUSE BY AT LEAST TWENTY VOTES—THE LOWER BY FORTY-SEVEN OR FORTY-NINE.

Complete returns show little change in the Republican majorities indicated Tuesday night for both branches of the Federal Congress. The Republicans have won an additional seat in the Senate by capturing the Legislature in Utah, and there is some prospect of a similar gain in Idaho, though the Bryan electoral ticket may win in that State by a narrow margin.

The Republican majority in the House of Representatives is likely to stand at 47 or 49. Returns last night indicated that 203 Republicans had been elected to the House, against 154 Democrats and Fusionists.

CHOOSE AT PRIOR STATE ELECTIONS.

TRIBUNE BULLETINS TRUE.

THE CROWDS APPRECIATED THEIR ACCURACY AND THE STEREOTYPIC OPTICON PICTURES.

The Tribune's bulletin board on Tuesday night contributed vastly to the enlightenment as well as the entertainment of the great throng of people which gathered in front of The Tribune Building to read the election returns. This crowd filled Park Row so full that streetcars could proceed only with difficulty, and it covered City Hall Park from its eastern limit half way to Broadway.

As authentic returns are frequently slow in coming, and as The Tribune disapproves the policy of filling up the intervals with guesses, a series of moving pictures had been provided to amuse the lookers on while waiting. These called out great applause. So did a number of The Tribune's trenchant cartoons, which it published in the campaign, and which had been transferred to lantern slides for this occasion.

Photographs of the Republican candidates and of many popular heroes of the Army and Navy were also displayed. These were brightly colored, and came out with gratifying distinctness on the screen.

TELEGRAMS RECEIVED AT NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS—MR. MANLEY'S COMMENT.

Mr. Manley endorsed the editorial of a morning Bryan newspaper giving 15 to 1 and the proposed plan to withdraw from the Philippines as principal causes for Bryan's defeat.

"But the first and best reason," he said, "was Bryan's nomination and the prominence of Mr. Croker throughout the campaign. Had any representative Democrat been nominated the election would in all probability have been close. At any rate we would not have had any such sweeping victory."

Senator Scott received a long distance telephone message from Governor-elect White, of West Virginia, saying that that State was 2000 sure for McKinley and that the Legislature would be Republican by forty on joint ballot, and a solid Republican Congress delegation. Mr. White's own majority will be from 1500 to 2000 behind that of McKinley, it is said.

Among the telegrams received yesterday afternoon were: Not only has Indiana given 6000 Republican majority for McKinley and Roosevelt, but we have probably gained two Congressmen.
