INTERESTING CLUB NOTES.

EDUCATION IN NEW-JERSEY—DAINTY PAMPHLET OF THE KING MANOR ASSOCIATION.

The conference of the Newark Educational Association with the Eastern Educational Association, which is to be held in Newark next April, will be an important event in the history of education in New Jersey.

The department of education of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs, of which Mrs. Florence Howe Hall is chairman, has done creditable work during the last year.

Article II. Power of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to withhold salaries or school moneys from teachers or county superintendents or districts not complying with the law, and to remove members of Boards of Education guilty of wilful neglect of duty.

Article VI. Appointment by the Mayor of Boards of Education in municipalities divided into wards unless the citizens vote to make such Boards elective by the people.

Article VII. Section 8. Declaring that women may vote at all school meetings on all questions save only the election of members of Board of Education.

Article IX. Section 113. The transportation of children, thus enabling weak districts to combine and establish schools.

Article X. Providing that all school buildings be constructed with due regard to proper heating, lighting and other school necessities.

Article XI. Union graded schools, which are in many cases infinitely preferable to small and feeble district schools.

Article XII. Lowering the age of admission to the kindergarten to four years.

Article XIII. Teachers' retirement fund.

Article XV. Compulsory education and parental or truancy schools.

Article XX. Manual training.

Article XXVI. School libraries.

Article XXVII. Teachers' libraries.

Article XXVIII. Teachers' retirement fund.

Article XXX. Permitting the employment of medical inspectors.

AN ITALIAN VILLA.

QUEEN MARGHERITA'S PROSPECTIVE HOME AN IDEAL SPOT.

Villa Malta, which is announced as the prospective home of the Dowager Queen Margherita, where she will probably spend the greater part of each year, was originally a possession of the royal family of Bavaria.

The grounds are entirely sheltered from public view by high, ivy covered walls and by hedges of roses. Yet from terraces built on each floor all around the house, and still more from the tower, the whole of Rome, the whole of the Campagna, the Albane and Sabine Hills, and even the sea, are visible.

The floor repeats in polished marbles the scheme of the Italian Renaissance ceiling, which possesses the peculiarity of being adjustable to any height preferred by the occupant of the villa.

Opposite the doorway a staircase of English design and construction, made of solid polished walnut, starts and runs at right angles round a part of the hall to the gallery above.

IT TRIUMPHANTLY WITHSTOOD THE SHOCK OF EXPLOSION AND THE FIERCE ORDEAL OF FLAME.




