

ANNUAL REPORT ON SCHOOLS BOARD OF EDUCATION ASKS FOR \$14,081,925 FOR NEW BUILDINGS.

The Board of Education, at its regular meeting held last night, received the charges preferred by ex-Chief Clerk John Wallace, who was dismissed last summer against Secretary A. Emerson Palmer. Without discussing the charges they were referred to the Committee on Supplies by the Board. The meeting was held at the hall, Fifty-ninth street, and a large number of members were present. President Miles M. O'Brien presided. Mr. Wallace charges that Secretary Palmer violated the provisions of the Civil Service regulations in permitting persons to go to work for the Board of Education without taking the oath of office as prescribed by law, and also in failing to report to the Board the omission of the failure to take the oath.

Mr. Wallace asserts that eleven persons appointed to school offices never took the oath as prescribed. It is also alleged by Mr. Wallace that nine school officers who did take the oath were overpaid. Mr. Wallace charges Mr. Palmer with neglect to comply with the rules and regulations of the Civil Service at other times.

Upon the report of the Finance Committee the Board decided to ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for \$14,081,925 for the selection of sites and the erection of new school buildings during the coming year. The report says that in the Borough of Manhattan and The Bronx \$12,828,808 is required. The Borough of Brooklyn wants \$2,500,000, Queens asks for \$1,574,920, while the Borough of Richmond wants \$250,000. The report of the committee asking for this sum as named was passed without discussion.

Three principals and seven assistant principals were placed on the list of the Board of Education. Lieutenant Lay H. Eberhardt was appointed executive officer of the schoolship S. Mary's by the Board of Education. A. Wiley, resigned. The appointment goes into effect on December 1 next.

The annual report of the Board, which was presented to the Mayor yesterday, it is said, treats at length of the necessity for more schools in the Borough of Manhattan. The report will be taken up at the next meeting.

The conclusion of last night's meeting Secretary Palmer was asked about the charges preferred against him by Mr. Wallace, but refused to discuss the matter, saying that the action of the committee to which the matter had been referred.

When Mr. Mcweeney closed his remarks fifty little boys and girls marched to the platform. Each one had two small American flags crossed on his breast, and one girl larger than the rest stood in front and waved a large flag. The children responded in concert the following pledge:

Flag of our great Republic, inspire in battle, guardian of our homes, whose stars and stripes stand for bravery, purity, truth and union, we salute thee, children of the distant lands, who find rest under thy folds, do please our hearts and our sacred honor to love and protect thee, our country, and the liberty of the American people forever.

The entire audience rose and joined with the children in singing "America," after which the children went through a series of calisthenics without dumbbells.

Dr. Blaustein spoke in German and the Rev. Dr. H. Madlauer began his remarks in Yiddish and English. He said that Thanksgiving Day is not a religious feast day nor a Christian festival, but an American holiday.
